The production of creamery butter Haldimand took quite a dip in September as compared with the same month in 1955 and the total ing September 30th in trailing last year's figure by about 85,000 lbs. This is in keeping with the figures for the whole province where production was down by 17 per cent for the month and 2.9 per cent for the month and 2.9 per cent for the period. The Haldimand figures for the month are 166,136 lbs. as compared with 277,223 lbs. in 1955.

Likewise the production figures for milk powder for the same month are down considerably from last year and the January-September total is below that of 1955. Skim milk powder which is the largest item in Haldimand is down by 200,000 ibs. for the month of September. Buttermilk month of September.
