the River Avon. Stratford-on-Avon is an old Town, in fact one of the

oldest in England. History states that a small monastry was established as early as the year 693 and by the time of the Norman Conquest comprised a small community of people, mostly engaged in agriculture. Some of the old buildings are the half-timbered pattern, there are still quite a number of this style of buildings, one of these on High Street is the Harvard House, it was built in 1596 and became the home of Rob ert Harvard and his wife Katherine whose son, John Harvard, founder the famous American University of that name. (We are quite busy with the camera all the time and we saw things of importance). Another one of these half timbered buildings was the birthplace of William Shakes he was born in April 1564, eloped with Anne Hathaway when he was London for some time, but returned to Stratfordon-Avon where he retired in 1610, to live with his family and friends where he did a time. y and friends, where he died on the 23rd April 1616. We wandered through the old birthplace of this great man and stood in the bedroon where he was born, saw the grammar school where he received his education, the beautiful park and Trust gardens along the river Avon and then out to Shottery just over a mile away from the centre of the town, to see the famous Anne Hathaway Cottage, this is a beautiful old building again in half timbered style and dates back to the Fifteenth Century

dates back to the Fifteenth Century, it is set in a beautiful old English Flower Garden, it was purchased from the Hathaway family in 1892 by the Shakespeare Birthday Trust, we took a couple of shots of this lovely old cottage with its flower garden and thatched roof, to add to our coland thatched roof, to add to our col-lection. On the monument and grave stone are carved the words in Olde English "Good friend for Jesus sake forbeare, To dig the dust enclosed heare. 


