When the corn contains more than 35 per cent moisture special precautions have to be taken such as reducing the width of the crib, the use of slatted ventilators along the side and in some cases even the use of forced cir may be necessary. The forced air may be necessary. The air may be either cold or hot. Should you be unfortunate enough to have corn that has more than 40 per cent moisture, it will be necessary to ex-ercise exterme caution and it might en be safer to ensile the crop than to try to keep it as dry corn.

It has recently been disclosed that a one to one mixture of 2-4-D and 2-4-5-7 mill. ture of 2-4-D and 2-4-5-T will do the job if applied in late May or early June at the rate of 1 lb. to 1 1-2 lbs. actual and per acre. This mixture is said to be effective on both first and second year plants. The secret of this treatment seems to be to have adequate coverage. If the fol-iage is light it may not be necessary to put on more than 50 gallons per acre but where the foliage is heavy this might be increased to as much as 100 gallons. A committee of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improveof the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association set up for the purpose has just been meeting and the foilowing prices have been suggested: No. 1 Commercial Oats, \$1.50 per bus., certified \$1.65 and Registered No. 1 \$1.75 to \$1.80, depending on the colour. It is expected there will be quite a supply of registered oats that will be up to the standard of Registered No. 1 for purity and germination but will be No. 2 because of the colour and that is the reason for the differential in price.

Barley prices will be \$2.00 per bus. for Commercial No. 1; \$2.50 for Registered No. 1 and \$3.00 per bus. for Registered No. 1 Brant Barley. This latter variety is high yielding and has proven itself to be worth the extra cost. 
