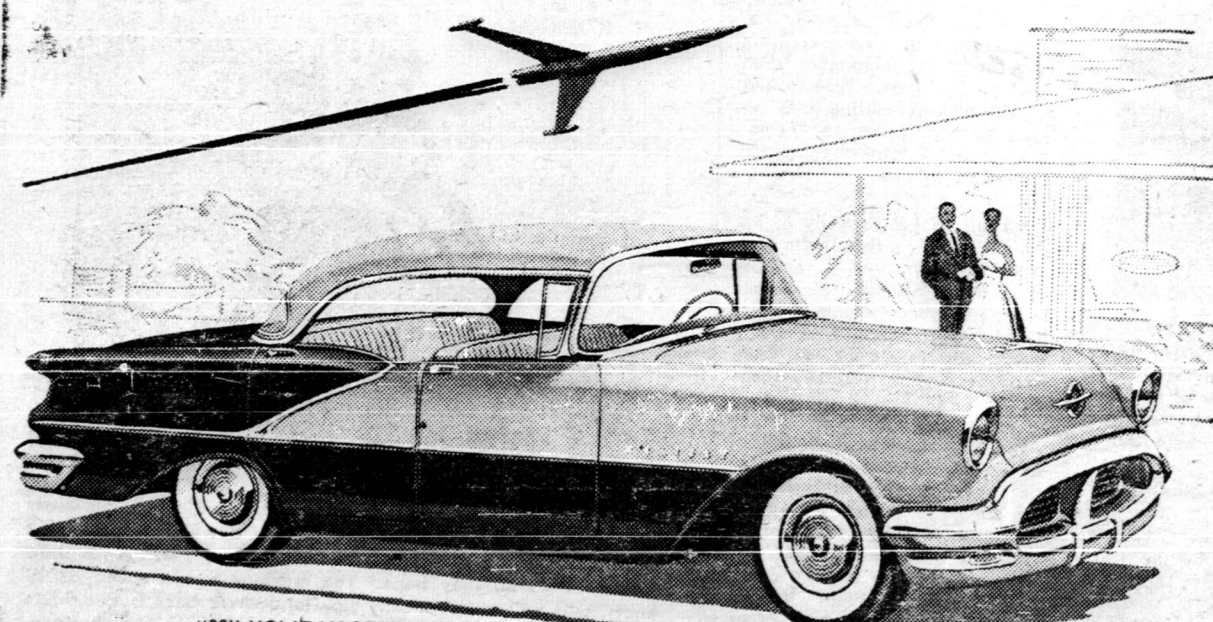

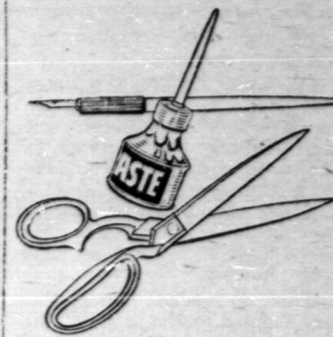

Dr. Durbin set out to discover, by scientific fact, just how hard the average housewife works. After scientifically computing the amount of energy spent by Mrs. Average housewife in the course of doing her daily chores he reports: "that housework is far less exhausting than most wives would like their husbands to believe."

What's more, an average housewife with no young children spends between seven and eight hours a day sitting down, says Dr. Durbin. Dr. Durbin found that the average housewife uses only 2,100 calories a day, which puts them in the category of light workers. Dr. Durbin admits he has not taken boredom into account which can make a woman tired in a way not measurable in calories.
