A Canadian tax expert estimates that the federal government has col-lected some \$25,000,000,000 in income taxes over the last 39 years— and predicted there will be no apreciable decline in the tax burden.
"I don't mean there will be no tax deductions—only that they will not be hig enough to recibil to recibil the big enough to recibil the second to recibility the second to recibili be big enough to really ease the load," said J. Harvey Perry of Toronto, director of the Canadian Tax

Of the 25 billion dollars gathered by the government since it went into the income tax field in 1917, three-quarters was collected in the last 10 years. Yet this toll on income was "the fairest and most scientifically devised method of obtaining govern-ment revenues yet devised." He called the income tax the fiscal counterpart of a half-century of social revolution in which rugged individualism had given way to state responsibility for high living standards.

Water Hemlock plants will grow from two to six feet in height and they thrive best in low, wet, swampy areas, ditch bottoms, stream banks and wet, poor ly drained pastures. The stems of the plants are hollow, smooth, sometimes purple-striped and ridged. The flow-ers are white and are produced in large clusters. The roots are tuber-ous and are somewhat similar to the tubers of the dahlia plant. Every farmer should be aware of

this weed and be able to recognize it as a dangerous plant. All pasture land should be examined periodically and when the weed is discovered i should be pulled out and all of the plants destroyed especially before any livestock are turned in. A piece of root the size of a cube of sugar will be fatal to both animals and humans. Death follows eating so fast that there is no time to take counter-measures. If you find any suspicious plants and wish to have them identified, contact the local office of your Department of Agriculture.

Because of the very bad weather conditions the seed wheat situation may be a bit tight. Much of the crop will be useless for seed purposes and indeed much of it will not be fit for milling either. This will create a problem and the wise farmer will be making immediate plan to secure an adequate supply of good seed at once, if he has not already done so. Be sure to check your own seed before sowing to make sure that it has sufficient germinating power This is extremely important to in ure a good stand.

It will not be long before som onsideration will be given to the housing of the milking herd and the question immediately arises as to the order in which the cows will be placed. Probably in many cases no thought is given to this item but in others it is carefully considered. There are at least four systems that can be followed when arranging the line-up. Probably the simplest one is according to size. If the stable has been built with stable has COLORFUL COVERS
