

## The Course At Harewood Acres

Harewood Acres is Canada's newest sports car circuit and has been made available to the sport through negotiations between its owners, Mr. Hare and Son and the British Empire Motor Club, Toronto.

The full circuit is three miles to the lap and a very good test of driver and vehicle. The circuit can be varied from time to time by merely changing course. This is being done to give greater spectator enjoyment and to allow a greater difference in lap times between large and small cars to facilitate handicapping in the One Hour Race.

A three year development plan is under way to make Harewood Acres one of the finest circuits available in this part of the continent. Great comfort and refreshment facilities as well as permanent buildings are planned for next year. It is also hoped that fencing will be complete all around the course making a greater area for spectators.

We believe that the pleasant atmosphere and surroundings of the course plus its sporting layout and nearness to the United States guarantee it a promising future.

The funeral service was held at the Senn and McKenzie Funeral Home, Hagersville, on September 5th at 2 P.M. Rev. Wm. Wood of Hagersville, having charge of the service, with interment at Jarvis Anglican cemetery. ### Driver Convicted

## PLACES WE VISITED

Well Laird, I have been requested, begged, coaxed and persuaded to write some of our travels in England. When I wrote of our trip across, I put down things just when they happened and as I saw them at that time, it was a little more difficult as it is all over now and I have been back to work since the 22nd August, but however I'll see what I can do.

If you will wash my dishes I'll try and write a letter each week until Mrs. B. gets back home. We were very fortunate in having a very good friend living in the south of England in 1944. Since that time his son, W. C. Fry, has been the publisher of the paper until his death. The late W. A. Fry was an unusual man. Not many would have had the courage to start a paper in a town the size of Dunville in 1886 against the opposition of two already established papers. The fact that the Chronicle is the only paper still living in Haldimand's largest centre is proof that Mr. Fry was a man who went ahead at the end of his nose. The Chronicle has grown steadily over the past sixty years and will likely continue to be an institution in Dunville and the County of Haldimand for a long time to come.

Not many of the present generation will remember the period when the late W. G. Clark contributed to the Municipal life of the Township of Walpole. Back in the twenties, however, Billy Clark was Reeve of the Township for several years and it is doubtful if any man ever had a greater knowledge of municipal affairs in his task. He studied the problems of the administration and was a doughty fighter for the cause of right as he saw it. The Haldimand County Council members have never slept in their chairs when Billy Clark was espousing a cause concerning the welfare of the Township of Walpole. Both Walpole and the County of Haldimand was the better for his services. His passing, however, removes a man who fulfilled his obligation of citizenship through public service. His kind just doesn't seem to exist today.

\$25,000,000,000 IN INCOME TAXES

A Canadian tax expert estimates that the federal government has collected some \$25,000,000,000 in income taxes over the last 39 years—and predicted there will be no appreciable decline in the tax burden. "I don't mean there will be no tax deductions—only that they will not be big enough to really ease the load," said J. Harvey Perry of Toronto, director of the Canadian Tax Foundation.

Of the 25 billion dollars gathered by the government and sent into the treasury, collected in the last 10 years. Yet this toll on industry and the "fairest and most scientific" method of obtaining government revenues yet devised.

He called the income tax the fiscal counterpart of a half-century of social revolution in which rugged individualism had given way to state responsibility for high living standards.
