On the Farm Front

The next big battle that cattle owners will have to face will be to control Mastitis. There is no doubt that sooner or later a demand will be made that dairy products must come from mastitis-free herds.

In any case this is quite a logical step. Tuberculosis has been pretty well eliminated from our herds and brucellosis is well on the way out. The next disease that is costing the cattle owner real money each year is mastitis.

Mastitis is sometimes called "garret" and in reality it is an inflammation of the mammary gland. It is a serious disease, as any farmer who has had a serious outbreak will tell you and it is of great economic importance right here in Haldimand. Some surveys (not in Haldimand) have revealed that as high as 50 per cent of the total number of quarters tested were infected. Naturally this means that the farmer in lowered production, loss of quality of milk and even occasional death losses.

Most farmers are aware of the outward appearance of the disease although this is extremely variable. In severe cases the udders are swollen, hot and very painful. The milk will be stringy, clotted and often bloody. In other cases the symptoms are not quite so marked. In fact there may be no external symptoms and the udder and the milk will appear normal. However, animals possessing this latent type of infection are inefficient producers and often act as carriers of the disease to other cows in the herd. This is the type that definitely requires laboratory tests for identification.

There are at least 17 different kinds of bacteria capable of producing mastitis although there is one "sleep" type that on which authorities are not quite so agreed. Even in herds that are infected, the cause of the infection is good practice to make such an attempt at frequent intervals in order to detect any outbreak early and to prevent it from spreading.

Further details regarding the treatment and control of this disease will be dealt with in a later issue of this column. In the meantime any cows which may be infected should be marked and milked last. This may necessitate some rearrangement in the milking order but nevertheless it will do much to prevent the spread of the disease to those cows that are still free.

10 ozs. sugar.
12 ozs. flour, self raising.
3 eggs.
Pinch salt and a little milk.
Beat butter and sugar to a cream. Beat eggs and beat well. Fold in flour and add milk as required to make a nice soft batter. Bake in a moderate oven for just over 1 hour.
