Historical Society Meeting

Held at Dunnville

Through the courtesy of the Dunnville Public Library Board, the December meeting of the Haldimand County Historical Society was held on Tuesday evening, Dec. 19th, at the Library, with the president, Mrs. H. E. Jones in the chair.

Before the meeting the members made a tour of the Library and were much impressed with the tastefully decorated rooms, the up-to-date selection of books and the friendly atmosphere. Special interest was shown in the children's section where the furnishings are scaled to size.

A minute's silence was observed in memory of the late Mrs. Thomas Rhodes, Cayuga, who always gave freely of her time and talents for the work of the Society and who is sorely missed.

Mr. J. M. Howland gave the Curator's report and mentioned among recent acquisitions a sausage machine and next in hand a clock-shelf cover, and two carbon electric light bulbs, 105 volt, made in Peterboro in 1901.

The Rev. H. H. Howey, B.A., B.D., Cayuga, was the speaker and his subject was "First Editions." Mr. Howey had on display quite a few first editions from his own library and delighted his audience with readings by the various authors. The oldest book Mr. Howey showed was a half a Bible, 1773. The most interesting was perhaps a reprint of the New Testament by Wm. Tyndale. Mr. Howey's copy, one of 25, printed in 1534, is in excellent condition and beautifully illuminated. Other authors whose works were shown were Helen Keller, Ian MacLaren, Alex. Brown, Browning, Robert Burns, Bernard Shaw and Robert Louis Stevenson.

Canadian authors were represented by first editions by Pauline Johnson, Nellie McClung, Stephen Leacock, Patricia Slatyer, Mrs. J. G. Little, Robert Service, Drummond, Bliss Carman and Wilson Macdonald.

Mrs. Jones expressed the thanks of the Society to the Dunnville Public Library Board for their kindness in allowing the use of the library for the meeting and to Mr. Geo. Rainey and Mrs. Edwin Parsons who arranged the program.

Annual reports will be given and the election of officers will take place at the January meeting.

Mr. Howey, Mr. Fraser Haney invited the members to their home after the meeting where refreshments were served and a social half hour was enjoyed.
