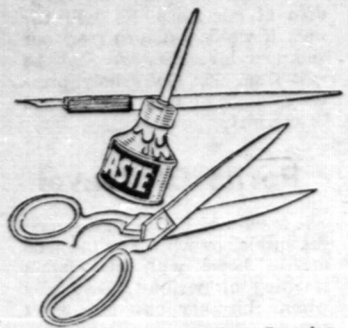


Local Items Of Interest

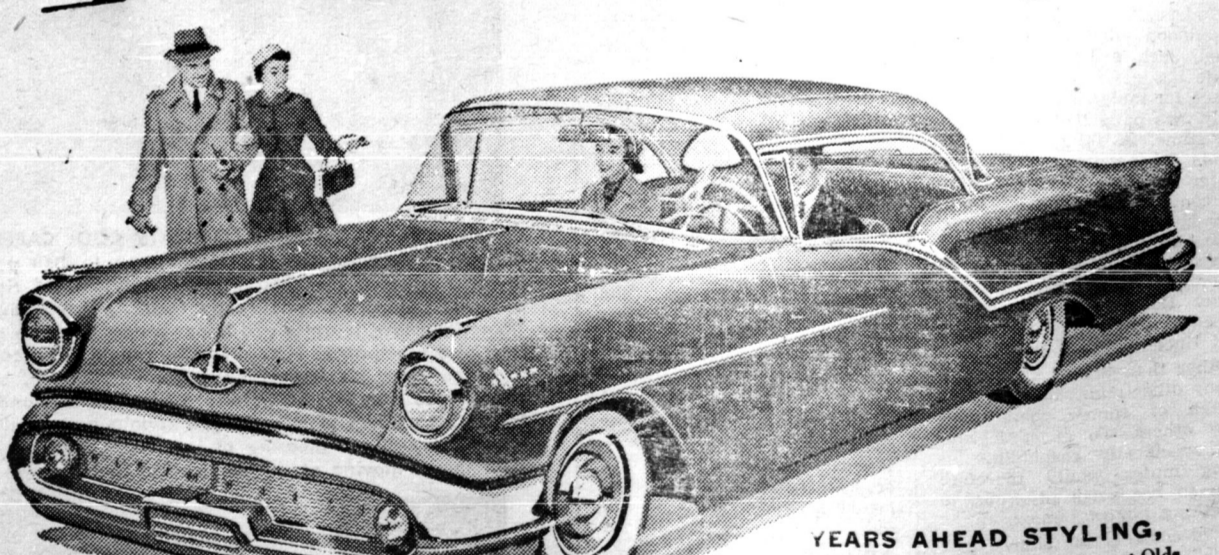
