Rules Governing Skating Parties To Port Dover

1. Transportation will be provided only for children under 16 years of age.
2. Only the approved number will be allowed on each bus.
3. All skating equipment must be put on the floor of the bus on entering and left there until the bus reaches its destination.
4. The return trip must be made on the same bus and all passengers going by bus will be expected to return the same way.
5. There must be two chaperones on each bus—one at the front and one at the back.
6. Drivers and chaperones will be expected to clean out their bus after each trip.
7. Drivers and chaperones are expected to stay with the children at all times.
8. All children will be expected to be orderly in their conduct.
9. Infractions of these rules will be punishable by a cancellation of privileges for a two week period.

Jarvis As I Remember It

I was born in the village of Hulsville (now Garnet) in March, 1876. I lived in Jarvis during 1879 and 1880 and until 1881 when I stopped off between buses I had one of these over-night ones about 70 years ago. However, there are few residents today who would remember the old town of those early days. On the main corner there were two hotels and a general store. The south east corner was a low vacant lot. The Commercial Hotel, operated by James Whitwell, the north east corner stood the National Hotel, (Houston's) and on the south west corner was J. A. Burwash's store, alongside of which was the town weigh scales. Elevated on posts to make it level with the sidewalk was a small frame building a short way from the present bus terminal, housing the Jarvis Record which was then owned by F. N. Pettit. Next to this was the Drug Store.

South of Burwash's store was Chamber's Hall (now the Oddfellows' Hall, I believe) and south of this, on an elevated lot was the Jones restaurant, the Anglican Rectory, Church and Cemetery as well as the Public School, which I attended. Just here I might mention my main reason for stopping between buses last spring was to see Stacey Burwash with house (still there), Miller's house and informed was still around, although I retired from the business he succeeded his father. I called at his house, at the far end of the town, which was owned by my grandfather, or rather faced Francis Brock, came from Ireland, and was the first school teacher in Jarvis (now Toronto). I soon Jim Crossen next to Murphy's, at the corner of the road was the old school, which was the town weigh scales. Facing the school was the Jarvis Record, which was then owned by F. N. Pettit. Next to this was the Drug Store.

Beyond Miller's was the railway station and beyond the turn, which is on the street, was the farm and Snyder's was McNelly's farm and opposite was my grandfather's farm (Forster) with Hough's farm or along was Underhill's Tailor Shop and C. G. Allen's Bakery. There was a small frame building a short way from the present bus terminal, housing the Jarvis Record which was then owned by F. N. Pettit. Next to this was the Drug Store.

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
