HAGERSVILLE HIGH NEWS In three short years, the W. F. Kolbe Co. of Port Dover has developed one of the largest poultry processing plants in Canada, employing in excess of 20 persons in peak periods. This information, along with a picture record of the huge plant, was revealed to the members of the Jarvis Lions Club on Monday night by Ross Hallam, Sales Manager of the Company. The Kolbe plant has been associated with the Poultry Industry on the Great Lakes for the past 30 years, starting operations in Youngstown, Ohio. They branched out to Port Dover in 1911 and maintained a fleet of fishing vessels out of this port until 1926 when the last tur was sold. In the past three years the operations of their huge plant has been centered on the processing of poultry, chiefly fryers and turkeys. The plant is now able to process 70,000 fryers and 20,000 turkeys per week. Their extensive freezing facility enables the Kolbe Co. to handle large volumes. Since last November the plant has been under Health of Animals inspection which is at all times. The speaker was introduced by Len H. Drinking Driver Gets Term in Penitentiary John L. Hayes, 36, of Bruce Street, Toronto, was sentenced to five years in Kingston Penitentiary by Mr. Justice Ferguson on Monday, after being found guilty of criminal negligence. The charge arose from a collision last November on Highway 10, two miles north of Cookville, in which Dr. Carman Hayer, 25, of Port Credit, was killed. An Assize Court jury returned a verdict of guilty of Criminal Negligence last Friday and Hayes was remanded until Monday. After pronouncing sentence, Justice Ferguson said "a person who deliberately drinks intoxicating liquor to excess, is a menace to everyone who comes into contact with him. He is a menace to the Highway. A blood test was taken from Hayer shortly after the accident, which showed an alcoholic content of 3.2 parts per thousand. Prof. Joslyn Rogers of the Attorney-General's Department, said he had seen very few cases with such a high concentration of alcohol in the blood. He said that a person would cause a "very high degree of intoxication in the average man and a terrible accident was inevitable." Two Toronto youths, D. Hammer and George Hall, testified that they were driving behind Hayer's car for some distance before the accident occurred. They said Hayes was weaving on the road and cut them off when they tried to pass it.

Timely Arrival of Firemen Saves Loss By Flames The timely arrival of the Jarvis Fire Department saved the main barns at the farm of Wilfred Koehn, on the Fifth Concession of Walpole, from being destroyed by fire early yesterday morning.
