## Federation Facts . . .

Simcoe Locks Forum felt that milk prices to the farmer and to the consumer have not risen comparatively to the wages of the industrial and commercial worker, so that now the wage earner can buy more quart jars of milk with their wages than he could in former years.

## Assembly Warden Visits District Lodges

Enjoyed Stan Burditt's Letters in the Record

Because the Jarvis area has outgrown its present telephone rate group, increases will go into effect on February 17th, to bring the rate into line with those charged in other centres with a similar number of telephones. D. A. McArthur, Bell Telephone manager for this region, said this week.

The increases are relatively small. For example, the monthly charge for two-party residence service will be only 10 cents higher and individual residence service 15c higher.

The move into a higher rate group was directed by the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada, following a Bell company report on October 1. The report stated that the number of telephones in the Jarvis calling area had increased by more than five per cent, beyond the maximum limit of the present rate group.

Telephone rates for Jarvis are governed by the number of telephones in the local calling area, on the principle established by the board that the company is required to report to the board twice yearly the number of telephones whose total telephones have increased or decreased more than five per cent beyond the limits of their respective groups.

The Jarvis area has expanded steadily in recent years and its progress has been accompanied by a parallel growth in the number of telephones. Jarvis residents now have 551 telephones in their local calling area.

The new rates will become effective following the 30 days' notice required by the board. This will be on February 17th.

The following table provides examples of the new monthly rates for typical classes of service in the present and new rate groups for the area.
