The flag now in the John Ross Robertson Collection of the Toronto Public Library, was prepared by Surgeon-Major G. S. Ryerson. He later became a major-general and also serv-

The game was so-named by early French settlers because of a similarity between the curved, webbed sticks used by the players and a bishop's crozier, or "la crosse." Said to be the oldest organized sport in America, lacrosse is Canadian in origin. A form of lacrosse called bag-gataway, was played by Indians long gataway, was played by Indians long before Europeans arrived. Although it has lost to hockey and football its former place as the most popular Canadian sport—it was referred to as Canada's national game—lacrosse still is very popular in some parts of the country and in other lands. Practically all of the lacrosse sticks in use are made at St. Regis Indian Reserve near Cornwall, Ontario.

Who United the Co-Operative Movement in Canada

An English-born journalist named George Keen is credited with forming the Co-operative Union of Canada in 1909. He remained general secretary of the union until 1943: He was widely known as editor of the Canadian Co-operator, which Canadian Co-operator, which was the oldest co-operative organ on the continent when it ceased publication in 1947. His memoirs, Birth of a Movement, were published in 1950 and he died at his home in Brantford, Ontario, in 1953.
