## Liberals Defeated In Conservative Sweep

### CCF AND SOCIAL CREDIT PARTIES WILL HOLD BALANCE OF POWER WHEN NEW GOVERNMENT FORMED

John Diefenbaker's crusade to bring an end to twenty-two years of Liberal power in Ottawa and to restore the supremacy of Parliament was endorsed by the Canadian electors on Monday when they gave the Progressive Conservative Party the majority of seats in the 265-member House of Commons. Late returns indicate that Mr. Diefenbaker will be called upon to form the next Government of Canada. It will have to depend on the support of one or other of the minority groups. It is expected this will eventually lead to another election, possibly within the next eighteen months.

The early returns on Monday night set a trend right across Canada with the exception of the Province of Quebec which ardent gave the Liberal Party almost solid support. Ontario was the key province in the Conservative sweep where sixty seats were taken out of eighty-five. The Maritime Provinces reversed their support from the Liberals to the Conservatives. Prince Edward Island elected all four Progressive Conservative candidates.

Gains for the P.C.'s were also made in the Western Provinces although additional Social Credit seats were won in the next Parliament. The early returns on Monday night set a trend right across Canada with the exception of the Province of Quebec which ardent gave the Liberal Party almost solid support. Ontario was the key province in the Conservative sweep where sixty seats were taken out of eighty-five. The Maritime Provinces reversed their support from the Liberals to the Conservatives. Prince Edward Island elected all four Progressive Conservative candidates.

### Jaguar Takes Carrera Test

A snarling white D-type Jaguar scored a kill in the gruelling 100-mile Canadian Carrera at Harewood Saturday last, by finishing a full lap ahead of its nearest rival. The win, second of the meet for the Jaguar, signified a day of sports racing, which drew a record crowd. The annual event is sponsored by the British Empire Motor Club of Toronto.

Spectators' cars ringed much of the 2.3-mile Harewood race airfield course. Piloted by Jack Enaley of Indiana, the Jag completed the 44-lap course in one hour, 18 minutes, 3.5 seconds at an average speed of 75.96 miles per hour. Second was Tommy Blomour of Toronto in a red Lotus Mark II. He completed 43 laps in one hour, 18 minutes, 57.3 seconds. The much famed yellow Porsche, driven by Art Bunker of Toronto, City, Mo., dropped out early in the race after pushing Enaley's car near a few laps. Bunker, a Sebring winner this year, turned in the fastest timed lap of the day at 80.39.

In the first race of the day, the crowd thrilled to a DeSoto's high speed struggle in which Tommy Gilmore's small Lotus triumphed over the fuel-injection Chevrolet driven by Ed Leavens of Toronto, but Leavens handled his car magnificently, slowing the race Corvair as he came up a long way in a short time.

The meet attracted some 110 entries from Canada and the United States. In a varied racing bill, cars participating ranged from the small sporty family sedans up to the most powerful racing machines. In the evening, a victory banquet was held at Simcoe Armories when trophies were presented to the various winners.

## Brant-Haldimand Gives Charlton Sweeping Win

### Fourth Consecutive Win



### JOHN A. CHARLTON

John A. Charlton, Progressive Conservative candidate for the riding of Brant-Haldimand, was accorded the largest majority ever accorded a candidate representing the County of Haldimand in history. He emerged from the voting on Monday with a clear majority of 4973 over his Liberal opponent, Garfield Disher, of Dunnville. This was Mr. Disher's third attempt to win the riding and his third successive defeat.

The early returns from local polls on Monday night reflected the trend throughout the entire riding and forty-five minutes after the polls closed Charlton's victory was assured. The first return placed to the record (Bailey's) which gave Charlton a majority of two votes—the first time a Conservative majority was given in this Poll. From then on each poll return indicated the same majority over Disher of 152 votes as compared to 63 in the 1953 election. The Village of Caledonia showed the biggest change in Haldimand County. Charlton increased his majority there from 271 in 1953 to 503. The Town of Dunnville, at one time considered to be a Conservative stronghold, gave Disher a majority of 268 in 1953 but returned to the Conservative fold this time with a majority of 183 for Charlton.

Four municipalities in the riding gave Liberal majorities. South Cayuga, Moulton and Sherbrooke Townships in Haldimand County. The combined Liberal majorities in these Townships was 247.

The following are the results for the various municipalities in Brant-Haldimand.
