During the month of April Haldimand hog producers marketed a total of 2,151 head through inspected plants and of this number 674 or 31.33 per cent were in the top grade. This grade contains many of the outweight hogs which are generally overfat and lacking in length, type or balance. The trend is in the right direction with more hogs going in the A grade.
