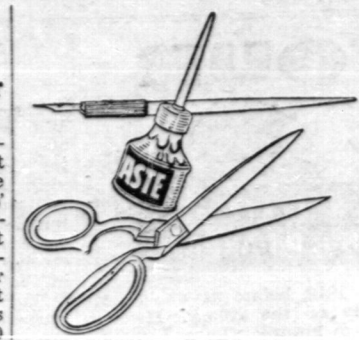


Hagersville High News

New Classes For Commercial Hogs at Caledonia Fair

The Swine Committee of the Caledonia Agricultural Society met last week to consider a suggestion made by the Haldimand Hog Producers Association to include a Breeder-Fooder Class in the Hog Show at Caledonia Fair. The Committee discussed the proposed arrangements for the Class and decided to include it in their list. A total of \$100.00 is being allotted to the Class with 50 per cent of this being paid by the Haldimand Hog Producers Association. Seven prizes are being offered starting at \$25.00 for first and ranging down to \$10.00 for seventh prize. The Class calls for one hog to be slaughtered in advance of the Show and three others to be exhibited alive. The carcass slaughtered in advance will be brought back to be exhibited with the live hogs. Provision is made for one entry only from each farm. Further details regarding the Class may be obtained from the Agricultural Society of members of the Executive of the Haldimand Hog Producers Association. Those present and representing the Swine Committee included George Berry, President of the Agricultural Society, Cameron Willett, Chairman of the Swine Committee, Jas. Howland and Everett Thompson. Mr. Lawrence Hagan, president, representing the Haldimand Hog Producers Association and A. Gordon Skinner, Agricultural Representative were also present.
