The death occurred in the Norfolk General Hospital, Simcoe, on Saturday, March 2nd, 1957, of Mr. Herbert Ward Copeland of Jarvis, Ont., after an illness of several months.

Mr. Copeland was born in West-Loxton, near London, on Jan. 24th, 1883, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Copeland. He received his education in that area and married the former Elizabeth Webster who survives him. He had lived in the Rochester and Selmon districts for several years and was a Life Member of Belmont Masonic Lodge, F. & A. M. No. 194. For the past six years he resided in Jarvis where he operated a restaurant. He was an adherent of Wesley United Church, Jarvis. Besides his wife he is survived by three sons, Henry L. St. Catharines, Carl E. of Lambeth and H. Barry of Sudbury; two daughters, Bernice (Mrs. Arley Dale) of London and Miss Beverly of Jarvis and Gravenhurst. One daughter, Helen (Mrs. Peter Madigan of St. Catharines) preceded him. Three grandsons also survive. Mr. Copeland is resting at the Wm. L. Copeland Home, Hagersville, until funeral service on Tuesday, March 5th, at 4 P.M. at the Wm. L. Copeland Home, 1539 and graduated from Osgoode Hall in 1908. He was appointed King's Counsel at the age of 37.

During his University and Osgoode Hall courses he worked with the City Parks Department as physical instructor and playground supervisor. He was an active participant in many college sports.

In 1925 he opened a law office and became the first secretary of the Kingsway Men's Association.

In 1946 he started his own law firm in Downtown Toronto and now has his own building on Harbour St. and a branch office in Oakville. He is chairman of the Tariff Committee of the Air Industries and Transport Association of Canada and is considered a leading authority on Administrative Air Law.
