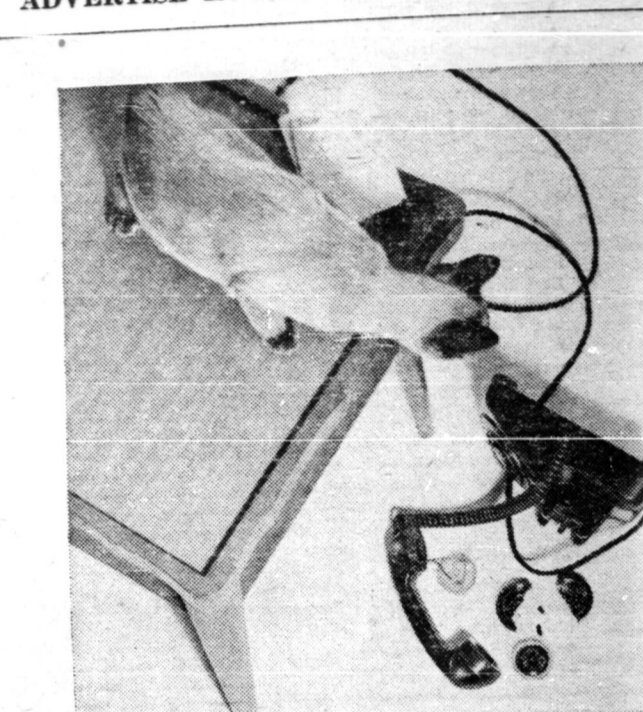

New Telephone Book Distributed in Jarvis

The new and definitely regional flavor to the 1957 telephone directory which is being distributed in Jarvis this week.

For the second time in many years, a familiar district scene appears on the buff-colored cover. Illustration is a drawing of the well-known Woodstock City Hall and the Oxford County Museum.

The sketch is the work of Lorré Bouchard, A.C.A., and replaces the illustration of the famous Bell Homestead at Tutelo Heights.

Also on the front cover—and even more important to telephone users—in a notice that the book does not become effective until April 1st at which time all Brantford residents will receive new telephone numbers. Telephone numbers there will take on the prefix "Plaza" to conform with the two-letter five-figure numbering plan which is gradually being introduced throughout Canada and the United States.

D. A. McArthur, Bell Telephone manager for this region, urged telephone users to bring their Blue Books in close contact with date, in order to avoid wrong numbering and unnecessary calls to "Information." Blue books in regular pocket size, are available at Bell Telephone business offices.

Besides Jarvis, the book also contains listings for subscribers in Brantford, Simcoe, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Paris, Tillamook and the surrounding territory.

Reflecting the growth of this area is the fact that the book contains 59,625 copies of the directory this year to supply residents in Brantford, Simcoe, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Paris, Tillamook and the surrounding territory. In Jarvis alone, there were 570 copies distributed this year, compared to 530 copies last year—an increase of 40 directories.

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Haldimand C.A.S. Hears Address On Adoptions

Adoption was a subject largely under discussion at the March meeting of the Children's Aid Society of Haldimand County held in Cayuga.

Lloyd Ecker, of Toronto, was in attendance and spoke to the board members on the topic of the adoption of older and handicapped children.

The committee planning the sixth anniversary dinner reported steady progress in the program. This is also the annual meeting of the society and will be held on April 9, at Kohler Youth Centre.

T. D. Jackson, local director, stated in his monthly report that the high intake in unmarried parent cases continued. January and February 1957 showed the highest figures in these cases handled by the society in its history.

A pension plan for the staff was also presented and accepted. A policy such as this is a necessity from the point of view of obtaining new staff if such an emergency should arise and the pension plan carries other advantages in terms of staff morale—this particular plan has been designed by the Ontario Association of Child Welfare Workers.
