Zone Committee Organized For Regional Project

Seed and Soil Service At Anglican Churches

A Regional Development Association has been formed for the Niagara Peninsula area, including the counties of Haldimand and Brant. These two counties constitute Zone 4 in the regional area.

The purpose of the Association is to promote the Economic Development of the area. Original steps in the plan were taken by the Trade and Industry Branch of the Department of Planning and Development. All Municipalities in the region were invited to join in the Association at an estimated cost of three cents per capita.

This rate was set on the basis of the population of the region and with majority support would yield approximately \$10,000 annually from the municipalities for promotional work. Provided this amount of money is raised the Provincial Government will match the amount by grant, thereby putting \$20,000 to work annually for the purpose of developing the economic possibilities of this area.

Each municipality favouring the plan was entitled to send two representatives to a zone meeting which was held at the Court House, Cayuga, last Thursday night. Walpole Council approved the plan at a special meeting held last Wednesday and the representative named was Russell B. Hare and Harvey Basindale. The Jarvis Council has, as yet, made no decision respecting the matter.

At the May meeting of the Council of the Jarvis Regional Development Association, the meeting was opened with the hymn "Lead Us Heavenly Father, Lead Us," followed by prayer by Mary Weaver.

Minutes of the last meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. Edward Meach.

Two thank-you cards were read. The Coyma Club Bazaar and Bake Sale held August 3rd, in the Parish Hall.

The hostess provided a most interesting and well-planned contest, the winners being Mrs. Russell Weaver.

The next meeting will be held at the Court House, Cayuga, on June 19th. The meeting closed with prayer and the hostess served a delicious lunch with cake and ice cream.

Arrangements Made For Safety Course

A representative from the Police Service, Inc. spent a day in Jarvis last week and with the co-operation of Police Chief Peter Banks and several local merchants, made arrangements for a Safety Course to be carried out in the Public School following the summer holidays.

The campaign highlight is a 34-page Safety Manual prepared by the Police Service, Inc. which will be distributed to the pupils by Chief Banks. Through the manual, the children will be taught the importance of safety and the consequences of unsafe behavior.

Those participating in the plan are highly enthusiastic concerning the possibilities of development through concerted action.
