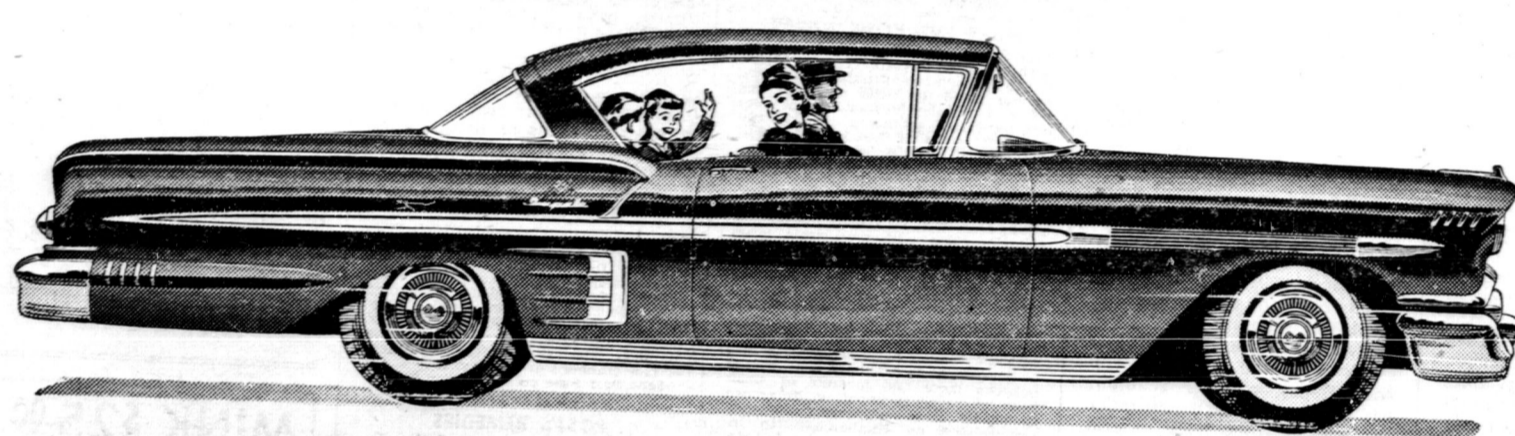

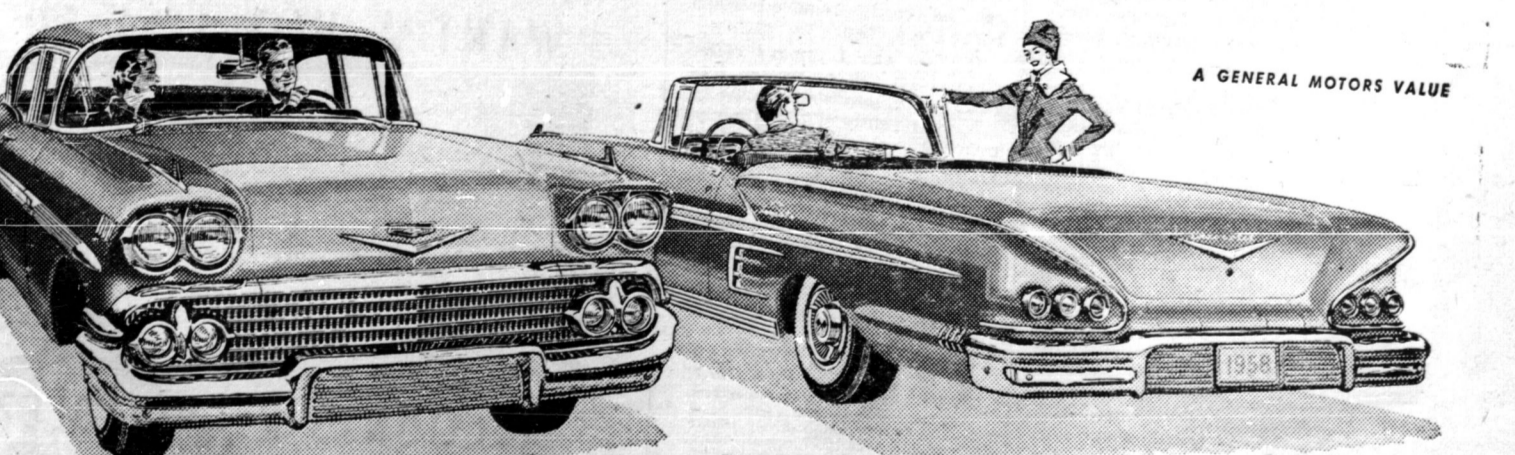

Federation Facts

However, as you have probably read, the Honourable Wm. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, has called a vote for early spring on the hog marketing plan. At a recent meeting of the Ontario Hog Producers Association the relevant question of assembly points and distribution of the hog industry was discussed. Mr. Hargrett said that "hog producers" will be voting on whether the hog industry is to be farmer-controlled through co-operative action or as it is to be turned back into the hands of the packers.

We in Haldimand are under voluntary direction of hogs at the present time. Hogs may be shipped or taken to the co-operative yards at Ancaster on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week or to the public stock yards at Toronto. It is hoped that as many farmers as possible will use these facilities as it is through the Hog Producers Co-operative that we are putting our hogs in the open market rather than delivering direct to a packer and letting him pay what price he will.

In discussing the topic "National Farm Policy" over one-half of the more than two hundred farm forums reporting felt that the price squeeze was the most fundamental problem in their particular type of farming. Nearly three-quarters of the forums said that a national farm policy could be designed to raise the general level of agriculture and at the same time meet the farmers' needs. However, when asked for the type of policy, the forums were not nearly as unanimous. Many of the forums did mention that if farmers were to all get behind an organization and support it then we would be in a much better bargaining position.

The Annual Meeting and Banquet of the Haldimand Federation of Agriculture will be held at the Rural Youth Centre, Kohler, on Thursday, November 28th. The annual meeting is at 11.00 a.m. and the banquet at 12.30. Mr. Cecil Belyea, Ontario Federation of Agriculture's economist and Mr. Ray Hergott, director of field services of OFA will give a joint presentation.
