November 27 products and fresh farm produce come under their jurisdiction in many cases. Operations in this field are very extensive, not only are they concerned with the grading of the products, and their quality, but also with the issue of even labels on the cans.

Thus when you buy a can of peas, you are sure that each can, even if bought months apart, will contain exactly the same size and kind of peas, provided the same grade is bought each time. The label must for you to judge—even though I suspect some artistic license is allowed in picturing the contents!

Maple syrup and maple sugar, because of the way in which it is produced, and because similar products can be made which have never been anywhere near a maple tree, have been a considerable source of trouble to consumers in the past. Government regulations now control much of this production. They even require the indication on menus in public eating houses, restaurants and hotels, where an artificial maple flavoured product is used, that it is not pure maple syrup. By now, it is easy to see just how wisely even this one section of the Department of Agriculture is bound up with our daily life. For beyond the work of guarding the nation's food stores, a vast network of activities which affect us more indirectly—the Experimental Farm Service, the Department of Agriculture, which does both pure and applied research on everything under the control of plants and studies with various farm animals to better the conditions of their life and the life of their stock, and the work of the various agricultural departments, which are so much a part of our daily life, are so much a part of our daily life.
