ON THE FARM FRONT

The study goes on to state that in general the pen barns were less expensive than the stall barns but the study also states that the individual barns rather than the two types of barns. There did not seem to be much difference in the amount of milk that was produced per man, but as might be expected the pole barns used more bedding, indeed a trifle more than twice as much. It will not be many weeks until the haying season will be underway and it might be a good idea to give some consideration to the methods of handling the hay. High quality roughage such as hay is one of the cheapest sources of nutrients. One method that has been used with some success in some quarters is to crush the hay with a special type of hay conditioning machine. This equipment is fairly expensive however, and it might be necessary to have quite a large acreage to make it pay. Hay treated in this way cured faster and produced a top quality product. The cost per ton was in the neighbourhood of \$3.50 where 80 to 90 tons was handled and \$2.40 where the tonnage was increased to 160 to 180 tons. The cost per ton was around \$1.50 in the former instance and just under a dollar in the latter.
