Probably the most important announcement of this week's Farmers' News is that the new Agricultural Stabilization Act has been proclaimed and went into effect Monday, March 3rd. This Act will establish a system of flexible guaranteed prices for agricultural commodities and will be based on a ten year moving average formula. It is expected that minimum prices on the nine mandatory commodities will be announced shortly. Others not on the mandatory list will be maintained on a compulsory basis with the province assuming the cost in all counties and districts.

One of the most important features of the new Act will be that many of the farmers who are refusing to accept Canadian cattle unless they are vaccinated as well. Under these circumstances, calfhood vaccination will be maintained on a compulsory basis with the province assuming the cost in all counties and districts.
