The award, designed to recognize and stimulate safety work by railroads in areas where they serve, went to 18 U.S. and Canadian railways.

History of Farm Marketing Plan Now In Operation

Very briefly, the events leading up to the present vote are these:

The Hog Producers' Association was formed in 1941 because of conditions in the industry which many producers felt required action by the producers. Chief among these were the abuses of the marketing system at that time.

At that time less than 10 per cent of the hogs produced in Ontario were sold on the public stock yards, and as a result there was no effective price setting market. With over 90 per cent of the hogs being delivered direct to the packing plant there was virtually no open bidding on the market for hogs. It has happened that the price would break during a period of light supply.

Board attempted to negotiate min imum prices, and other condition of trading, with the representative of the processors. But, in 1951 the open to producers was to appoint Marketing Agency under the provisions of the Act, and this was don in 1952, with the selling operation beginning early in 1953. 
