Higher Livestock Prices Increased Cattle Sales

Higher livestock prices and increased cattle sales, partly to the United States buyers, boosted the income of Canadian livestock producers in 1957 to a record \$66,000,000.

The increase of 13 per cent was reported in the federal agriculture department's annual review, released last week. It said the greater gross value also resulted from sales of better quality animals, and sharply higher prices for hogs.

"Domestic demand throughout the year and export buying from May onward were such that supplies were never burdensome, and weekly clearances were the rule," said the report. Cattle marketings hit a record 2,694,968, an increase of 12 per cent over 1956. This resulted from increased livestock production in the traditional grain-growing provinces of Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Alberta.

Calf marketings were a record 1,033,580. Hog marketings, at 5,400,259, were a drop of nine per cent, or 100 lbs. up, almost \$3 from 1956. Sheep and lambs at 598,979 head were down about 10,000.

By-Law 1266

Of the Corporation of the Township of Walpole for Regulating the Time of Payment of Annual Taxes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Walpole as follows:

- 1. One-half of all taxes, including local improvement assessments and any other rates payable as taxes shall be due and payable on the 15th day of July in each year and the other one-half of such taxes including local improvement assessments and any other rates payable as taxes shall be due and payable on the 15th day of November in each year.
