

New Red Clover Varieties For 1958 Queen Elizabeth Hotel Opening Dates Set

Lasalle red clover has proven to be an excellent variety in Ontario. Its big feature is superior persistence. More of the plants live through the second winter so that second year clover-timothy fields produce higher yields of hay higher in feeding value especially in protein. Lasalle is recommended especially for red clover-timothy mixtures on fields not suited for alfalfa and where the field is to produce hay and pasture for two years.

Lasalle seed is in short supply for all farmers who wish seed to obtain seed of this variety. A small quantity of Dollard red clover seed is also on the market this year. This variety, Dollard, has been equal in value to Lasalle in trials at the Ontario Agricultural College and can be used if Lasalle is not available.

ON THE FARM FRONT Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

Research at Ottawa has shown that a pig excretes 60 per cent of the nitrogen in the feed it consumes, approximately 75 per cent of the phosphate and 90 per cent of the potash intake. Supposing that a 15 per cent protein ration is provided and at current fertilizer prices, \$6.15 worth of fertilizer value should be recovered from every ton of feed used. On this basis, 100 tons of feed could give a total of \$615.00 fertilizer value and this would go quite a long way in balancing some of the overhead or labour charges.

By the time he was nine years old Johnny was a problem child, a bright intelligent but embittered youngster. What arose from the Ontario Society for Crippled Children, young nurses and therapists had aided him, suggested he go to summer camp. His parents recoiled at the thought. His mother at first insisted she should accompany him.

Finally Johnny went to camp. His first days were bad, yet within a week he had seen other youngsters far more severely handicapped than he enjoying life. By the end of the camp term Johnny was one of the happy group, and appeared in play had learned craft work and was engaged to go to school when he got home. Practical applied Psychology had worked its wonders.

Quite naturally, soil is at the top of the list and Professor Thomas enlarges on this by pointing out a number of special considerations with regard to the soil.
