## Charlton Gets Landslide Win in Brant-Haldimand

### Celebrate Her 87th Birthday

With a majority of more than 8,500 votes over his nearest opponent, John A. Charlton, was re-elected member of Parliament for Brant-Haldimand on Monday. He was re-elected with 8,500, and the early returns on Monday indicated the further gains he would make this time. Practically every poll in the riding gave him 2-1 support with the Village of Jarvis showing the strongest with 74.5 per cent of the vote cast in his favor.

The Town of Paris, regarded as his home community gave him 100 per cent support for a close second to this Haldimand village.

Other significant changes in the voting trend was noticed in Dunnville where Charlton had a majority of 943, as compared to a majority of 132 last year.

The complete election figures for the various municipalities in the Brant-Haldimand riding will be found in another column, along with a breakdown for the Township of St. Joseph, who gave the Progressive Conservative candidate a record majority of 486 votes.

Rev. Kenneth Brunton Heads Bible Society

Rev. W. W. Moore, of Toronto, addressed an inter-church meeting in Wesley United Christian Education Building on Sunday night. Speaking on the History, Aims and Future Needs of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which has 16 branches in Canada. The Upper Canada Branch, which serves Ontario, has fulfilled a definite need during the past 60 years, and is faced with increasing costs as well as increasing responsibilities in this time of religious awakening. Founded in England 154 years ago, the first work done by the Bible Society, was the printing of the translation of St. John's Gospel into the Mohawk language. This translation was made at York, in Haldimand County by Col. John Norton.

A film showing the work of the Bible Society, the subsequent destruction of the Bible House in Seoul the rescue of some portions of translations which enabled the New Testament to be printed in Japan and 500,000 copies to be sent back to troops and civilians in Korea.

Rev. J. A. Logan presided, with Rev. K. Brunton reading the scripture and Rev. J. Dykstra leading in prayer.

A short business meeting followed, with officers being appointed: President, Rev. K. Brunton; Secretary and Community Chest Representative, Mrs. R. A. Miller; Treasurer, Ralph Gowan.

## ON THE FARM FRONT

### Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

Surprisingly enough, the County of Waterloo was the heaviest importer of feeding cattle with 51,139 head to the limit. The next nearest county in volume was Kent with 21,619 head. Other counties in order are Huron, 18,475; Wellington, 17,884; Middlesex, 16,298; and Bruce with 12,003 head. In the final analysis, Waterloo County brought in almost one-quarter of the total cattle of this type that were moved into counties in Ontario. The grand total for 1957 was 210,935.

Is Haldimand going to be on the band wagon in the brucellosis fight? Can the breeders of this county afford not to get behind this program and push it to the limit? This county is reputed to be the third highest county in the Province in the number of cattle exposed to the United States and with many of those states closing their borders to cattle from counties not under sound control plan. It can mean a tremendous loss to the breeders if we are not in it. And when a county is not in it and when a control area plan comes around let be behind it and see that it carries with the biggest possible majority.

The beef and swine breeders of Haldimand held a very successful sale last week with 28 head of cattle and seven hogs being sold. The average price received for the cattle was \$244.00 and for the swine \$125.00. Top price for the sale was \$620.00 paid by John Smith of Loretto, Ontario, for a Hereford bull, consigned by Jarvis Hereford Farms. Mr. Don Moerschleider & Son, Rainham Centre, paid the top price for a sow consigned by Walker Hedges of Canfield. The amount was \$160.00.

## Diefenbaker Government Wins By Record Majority

The Progressive Conservative Party was returned to power in the Federal election on Monday, with the greatest majority enjoyed by any government since Confederation. The P.C.'s made gains from the Atlantic to the Pacific with the greatest come-back in the history of the party. The P.C.'s elected 50 members with 25 going to the Liberals. The Prairie Provinces where the splinter parties have long enjoyed success, and particularly in Saskatchewan and Alberta, the P.C.'s made sweeps. The Social Credit Party failed to elect members as against 19 in the last parliament.

Veteran Liberal Cabinet Ministers James G. Gardiner and James Sinclair were both defeated. The only two cabinet ministers from the Liberal Government, prior to the June 1957 election re-elected are Lester Pearson and Paul Martin.

The P.C.'s increased their members in Ontario by eight seats, with all of them being gains from the Liberal Party.

Alberta, the P.C.'s party had three Ontario seats in the last parliament and will again have the same representation.

Hon. M. J. Coldwell, leader of the C.C.F. Party and a member of Parliament since 1935, was defeated. Susan Love, leader of the Social Credit party received the same treatment in his riding of Peace River.

All Progressive Conservative Cabinet Ministers in the last Parliament were re-elected.
