ON THE FARM FRONT

Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

BY HALDIMAND HARRY

The work that has been done by the Haldimand Soil Improvement Committee has been pretty conclusively that applications of nitrogen in one or other of the various forms has produced a very noticeable increase in the heavy clay soils in the County. One point, however, should be noted, and that is that nitrogen alone will not give the results that we look for. In other words, there must be a balance between the nitrogen level, the phosphorus level and the potash level. Furthermore this level must be maintained.

It should therefore be remembered that continuous applications of nitrogenous fertilizers without the addition of other plant food elements to maintain the proper balance in the soil can only lead to unsatisfactory results. Considerable harm can be done to the good work of the Soil Improvement Committee if this is not kept in mind. Most of our common farm crops require plentiful supplies of all three plant food elements. For full information on this subject, you will require somewhere in the neighborhood of 80 pounds of nitrogen, 30 pounds of phosphorus and 25 pounds of potash to produce the grain and the hay. This means a total of 135 pounds of potash and 25 pounds of phosphorus and 120 pounds of potash.

It can therefore be seen that the application of nitrogen alone would produce such a crop unless the soil happened to be particularly rich in those other elements. This is particularly the Grand River. Yellow River has the habit of following water courses too, although it year but it could not go on indefinitely. This further proves the value of having a soil test made and then Common Mustard is capable of producing as many as 15,000 seeds in the crop and the need of the soil. For instance if the soil is fairly high in one or other of the plant foods, the fertilizer application can be a little lighter. The use of 2-4-D chemicals will reduce the number of weeds and grasses in the field.
