Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

The work that has been done by the Haldimand Soil Improvement Committee has shown pretty conclusively that applications of nitrogen in one or other of the various forms will give a very satisfactory response on the heavy clay soils in the County. There is one point, however, that should never be forgotten and that is that nitrogen alone will not give the results that we look for. In other words there must be a balance between the nitrogen level, the phosphate level and the potash level. Furthermore this level must be maintended to the maintended to the high standard of our product. Considerable harm can be done to the good work of the Soil Improvement Committee if this is not kept in mind. Most of our common farm crops require plentiful supplies of all three plant food elements. For instance a 100 bushel crop of corn will require somewhere in the neighborhood of 90 pounds of nitrogen, 35 pounds of phosphorous and 25 pounds of potash to produce the grain and added to this will be 70 pounds of nitrogen, 25 pounds of phosphorous and 95 pounds of potash to produce the stalks. This means a total of 160 pounds of nitrogen, 60 pounds of phosphorous and 120 pounds of potash.
