ON THE FARM FRONT
Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer
By HALDIMAND HARRY

"Hardware disease" or the trouble with dairy cattle consists mainly in the consumption of sharp metal objects, particularly dairy cattle, is a well known fact that has been pointed out by many writers. It seems to be one of those cases where prevention is better than cure. Unfortunately it is rather difficult to diagnose the condition until it is almost too late although surgery can be practised where the condition is found in time and the offending objects can be removed.

The prevention of this problem with dairy cattle consists mainly in making sure that the barnyard and other places where cattle are likely to gather, is free of loose nails, wire and any other sharp metal. Baling wire is one of the culprits and it is important that all pieces are gathered up and that the wire in the hay, ground feed or silage. Most feed manufacturers are now using plastic instead of wire in their silage. This worked out at \$8.21 per ton of digestible nutrients. On the same basis it cost \$12.21 per ton of alfalfa; \$24.26 per ton of corn silage and \$56.24 per ton of digestible nutrients in oats.

Beef cattle have been coming into their own during the past number of years and it is possible the end is in sight. It may be that the industry is still an absolute essential in the management of the beef herd. That is a well known fact that fertilizer materials are highly corrosive due very largely to the fact that they attract moisture and this moisture causes rust and hence corrosion. All equipment that comes in contact with fertilizer should therefore be well cleaned out and it is a good idea to put a coating of old oil over all surfaces and this is especially true in the case of working parts.
