The Burial of an Unknown Warrior - -

An impressive service was held in Westminster Abbev, ondon, England, on November 11, 1920, the second anniversary of the Armistice, on the occasion of the burial of an unnown soldier. "In proud memory of those warriors, who died unknown in the Great War, 'Unknown and yet well-known rds of the inscription on the wreath which the King placed apon the coffin. During the ceremony of the unveiling of the enotaph, whither the coffin was carried on a gun carriage hout the British Empire. Dean Ryle, the High Bailiff and ergy, with the Choir, singing the hymn "Brief Life is Here Our Portion," then processed to the North Door, where they and preceded it to the West End. Upon the coffin, which was draped by the famous "Padre's flag" - the blood-stained Inion Jack of the Ypres salient, which had served alike as an altar cloth and funeral pall at the front - beside the King's wreath, lay a steel helmet and side arms. Distinguished officers carried the pall. King George, attended by his two elder sons, Edward, Prince of Wales and Albert, Duke of York, representing the Army and Navy, and by his uncle the Duke of onnaught, walked as chief mourner immediately behind the The Premier, Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Asquith, the Cabinet Ministers, and many members of both Houses of Parliament followed in the procession to the West End, that passed first along the Transept and Choir, where every seat was filled with mourners, and so down the Nave, which was lined with a

nundred V.C.'s, 50 on either side, in civilian dress, and in uniorms, behind them the mothers and wives of fallen soldiers. Here four Queens: Mary, the Queen-Consort, Alexandra, the Queen-Mother, the Queens of Spain and of Norway, with other nembers of the Royal Family, and many distinguished personages, awaited their arrival. A shortened form of the burial rice was held, the Dean reading as the Lesson part of the Chapter of Revelation, verses 9 to 17. After the singing the hymn "Lead, Kindly Light," the King stepped forward and at the words "Earth to Earth" dropped a handful of French earth upon the coffin as it was lowered into the grave. At he conclusion of the service the whole congregation, standing, ang Rudyard Kipling's solemn Recessional, and after the Reveille and Last Post had been sounded by trumpeters from Henry the Fifth's Chantry Chapel, the royal and other mourners silently dispersed. The beautiful silk pall, which was presenfed in 1920 by members of the theatrical profession in memory of their brethren who fell in the War, was then laid above the open grave. Upon it was placed the Ypres flag. For a brief while, after the doors were re-opened, four Servicemen, representatives of the Navy, Army, Marines, and Air Force silent watch, with arms reversed and bowed heads at each corner of the space reserved for the grave, while the first of ceaseless throng of mourners, bearing floral offerings, ssed beside the barriers. Day after day numberless multitudes of pilgrims of every class and almost every nation, East
