The old law of supply and demand no longer, apparently applies in Africa. It seems the influences of North America are spreading. "Modernization has caught up with the ancient African Tribal Custom of Lobola—a tradition which insisted that a would-be groom pay for his prospective bride. For centuries the accepted form of payment was cows, the standard price being 10 cows for one bride. A few years ago the brides went on a cash-and-carry basis, with 50 pounds (about \$140) using the accepted rate. But now brides can be bought on the instalment plan. The price is still the same but the old custom, that a man could not live with his bride until he had paid lobola in full, is fast vanishing. Many grooms insist on being married as soon as the first instalment is paid to continue the payments. But would-be husbands con- sider with the argument that the fathers are not playing fair either. The common complaint among the young men looking for brides is that fathers in various areas get together to form daughter marketing boards.

Once these fathers have cornered the market in marriageable females, they jack up the prices to the point where they are making handsome profits.

One young man, writing to the *Banner Mirror* of Bulawayo, South Rhodesia, pointed out this profiteering in a bitter letter which said: "I had to pay \$400 in cash plus a hat, raincoat, pair of shoes, blanket, umbrella, dress and necklace for his bride. In addition, he had to slaughter a fat cow for his prospective in-laws to eat."

"And after all that, he wrote, 'I had endless trouble with my wife.'"

"From time to time, particularly when retail prices are rising sharply, the distribution system comes under heavy criticism. Protests are frequently made to the effect that distribution costs are out of proportion to the services performed. Such criticism seldom takes into account the complexity of the distribution system and the variation in costs that arise from the differing nature of products that flow through the system. Moreover distribution processes are, on the whole, less amenable to cost reductions through new applications of capital equipment than are production processes in manufacturing and processing industries. RETARDED CHILDREN NEED ATTENTION

Were you aware that during this past week the first Canadian conference on mental retardation was held in Calgary? Did you know that mental retardation is one of our country's gravest social problems? The President of the Canadian Association for Retarded Children estimates that there are about 48,000 retarded persons in Canada. That is about the same number of people as make up the population of New Brunswick. These retarded persons affect directly or indirectly as many people as are now living in British Columbia. About 16,000 of these retarded persons are children. The main aid in the battle to help the retarded and their families, and to establish research into the cause and cure of mental retardation. This is a field which has been sadly neglected in our present day medical research. Unless something is done, there is a possibility that 1400 retarded children will be born in Canada next year.

The executive director of the New York State Association for Retarded Children says: "There is no doubt how much we must change the world for our children's sake. It becomes clearer and clearer to me that whatever we do for the other fellow's child we are doing for our own—or for the generations yet unborn."

ONTARIO HOG PRICES

OCTOBER 28th—24th

TORONTO—October 22nd—The general price of hogs in Ontario this week has been \$25.50 per cwt. at marketing yards of the Ontario Hog Producers Co-operative. Ontario heavy sows moved at \$17.00 and light sows at \$19.00 and stags at \$16.00.

Prices on the western markets this week are as follows: Winnipeg Monday to Wednesday reports \$22.00 to \$22.50; Edmonton Monday Monday \$21.85 and Tuesday \$22.05. Current hog prices on the Montreal markets are as follows: "The west end market reports \$25.00 for heavy and Wednesday and the east end market \$24.00 for the same people are now anxious to serve on two days. No reports were received for Monday.

Total hog gradings for the province of Ontario during the week of October 13th to 17th were 46,283 which was up 765 from the previous week. Turnout of hogs at the marketing yards of the Hog Co-op during the week of October 13th to 17th was 44,053 which was 94% of gradings.
