Hereford Banish Markham Now Enter Quarter Finals

Hon. James N. Allan Receives New Award

For his services in the cause of traffic safety, Hon. James N. Allan, Provincial Treasurer, has become the first individual recipient of the newly instituted Canadian Highway Safety Award.

Mr. Allan, M. P. P. for Haldimand-Norfolk, received the award at a banquet last week at the Royal York Hotel at the wind-up of the Canadian Highway Safety Conference.

The award has been set up to honour individual Canadians or organizations who have made exceptional contributions in the realm of highway safety.

The Executive Committee of the Canadian Highway Safety Conference agreed unanimously that Mr. Allan should be the first person to receive the honour.

Mr. Allan has always been interested in programs and plans aimed at reducing traffic accidents, and making the roads of the Province and the Nation less hazardous.

He was vice-chairman of the Ontario Highway Safety Committee in 1951.

Later, as Minister of Highways and as the Minister of Transport and organizer of the new Department of Transport, he put into effect many of the recommendations of that committee.

In his former portfolio, he looked upon the development and promotion of highway safety measures as his most important responsibilities.

Other Atkinson wins included Reserve Senior Champion bull with the 2-year-old Chesapeake Prince 2nd. First prize ribbons went to the Atkinson entries in the get of sire class. Premier breeder and premier exhibitor or banners were also won by Atkinson.

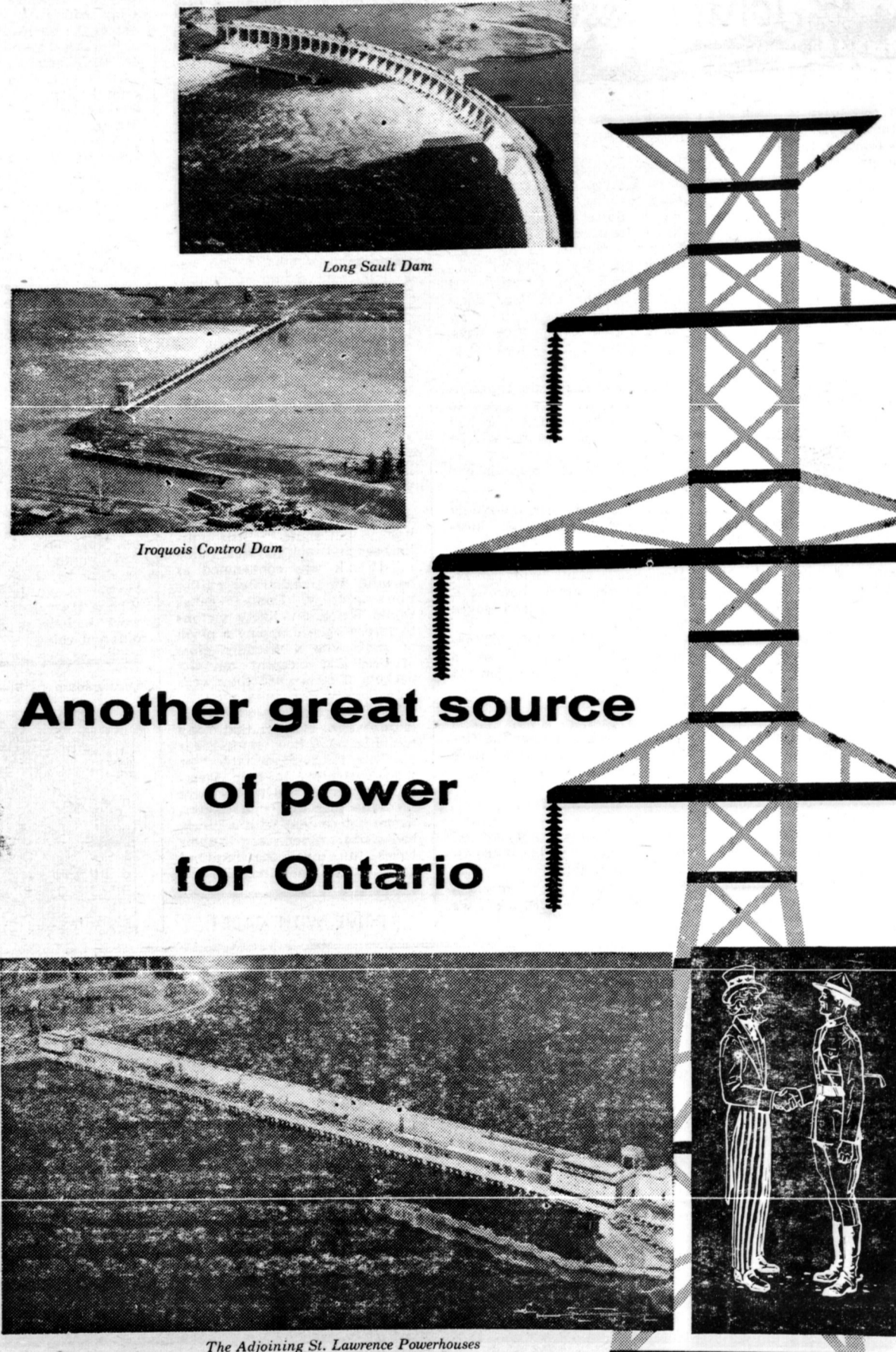
