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Ice Storm Cuts Hydro and Telephone Service

This district along with most other parts of Southern Ontario is still feeling the effects of the ice storm that set in on Tuesday night. The snow and ice have cut off Hydro and Telephone services from 15 to 48 hours or longer.

The storm was one of the worst ever seen in the area. A coating of ice more than one inch thick weighed down trees and poles in so many places the crews could not keep up with the necessary repairs.

Tree limbs and television aerials were scattered in all areas. Several two telephone poles were broken from Selkirk north to No. 3 Highway and similar damage was reported from many areas.

The power line was broken shortly after noon on Monday and was not restored until shortly before six A.M. on Tuesday night.

All four nominees for the North Area School Board qualified and the electors will be called on to select three. The candidates are Emerson Phillips, Orif Almas, Lloyd Rutherford and Jack Phibbs. The Polls will be open on Monday, January 4th, from Nine O'clock in the morning until Five O'clock in the afternoon.

With the retirement of Reeve Kenneth Parkinson an acclamation for the Re-reeveship was assured. Deputy-Reeve Ted Montague to head the 1960 Walpole Council. An acclamation was also accorded Councillor Harvey Bassindale who received the only nomination for the Deputy-Reeveship. Both of these men will represent Walpole Township in the Haldimand County Council next year.
