ONTARIO HOG PRICES FEBRUARY 16th-20th

Toronto—February 19th: In Ontario this week Grade A hogs have been selling generally at \$28.00 per cwt. at marketing yards of the Ontario Hog Producers Co-operative. Some yards reported hog sales 10 to 25c higher per cwt than Toronto. Heavy hogs have been moving all week at \$18.00 and light sows at \$20.00 while stags continue to move at \$16.00 per cwt.

Winnipeg reports hog sales at \$22.50 to \$22.75 Monday to Wednesday, Edmonton, Tuesday-\$21.75 and Wednesday-\$21.70; Calgary, \$21.50 for Monday to Wednesday.
