# Point System for Drivers Becomes Effective February

Motor vehicle drivers in Ontario are looking forward to the point system, which becomes effective February 1, 1959, with a certain amount of fear. Actually, the fear is unfounded. The point system is a program under which certain values are assigned to each conviction registered against a driver. The court reports the convictions to the Ontario Department of Transport where the points are assessed and accumulated against the operating record of the convicted driver.

The purpose of the point system is to provide a uniform method of assessing the persistent violator special department action and to curtail the co-operation of all drivers on the safe, efficient use of the streets and highways. It is a means of rectifying the driving habits of the driver before it becomes necessary to suspend his driving privileges. It seeks to improve drivers rather than punish them. It will serve to protect the safe, sensible drivers against the reckless and irresponsible.

Points will be accumulated over two year period. After two years they will be deducted from the record. If three points are assessed for conviction registered in February 1959, such points will be deducted from the accumulated total in February 1961. Each driver starts with 12 points in the demerit system. These are the point losses for convictions:

- Criminal negligence involving use of a motor vehicle—12 points; Care or control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated—12 points; Care or control of a motor vehicle with ability impaired—12 points; Obtaining a driver's license by fraud or misrepresentation—12 points; Falling to stop at a stop sign or signal light—9 points; Exceeding speed limit by 10 mph or more—5 points; Exceeding speed limit by more than 10 mph and less than 20 mph—3 points; Falling to obey a stop sign or signal light—3 points; Falling to report an accident—3 points; Exceeding speed limit by 10 mph or under—2 points; All other moving violations—2 points.
