Worst Flood In History Hits Jarvis

The worst flooding condition re-membered in the history of Jarvis was experienced last Wednesday night and Friday. The water covered parts of both Main and 1st streets for several hours and filled many cellars with water. Several homes also were flooded at the first floor level. The flood was caused by a sudden rising of the temperature and with the abundant snow fall of the recent days, the water simply could not get away. This was the general ex-perience in all sections of the area. Both No. 6 and No. 3 Highways were flooded in low areas and only heavy diesel trucks could get through for a couple of hours. The homes border- ing the creek running through the village suffered the most. The fire truck was used on Thursday morning to pump several homes dry. Four pumps were required at one time to keep the water level down in the boiler room at the Marshall Dairy. The water level was getting dan-gerously close to the fire box at one time.

It seems that a new problem has developed in the feeding of dairy cows where a milking parlour is be-coming scarce. The dairy cow like every-thing else is hurried. There was a time when the cow could stand in her stall and eat her grain and conce-trate ration in leisure. All has been changed now and as she goes through the milking parlour she has to eat her grain ration. This has deter-mined that all things running smoothly, a cow will stand in a milking stall for eight to nine minutes. It takes an average of two minutes to eat a lb. of grain.
On the other hand, if pasture con-ditions are poor or the winter rough-ness is not all that it should be, the farmer may have to happen upon some extra stalls or arrange to have the cows take a little longer to eat their grain ration. This does not mean that the milking machine should be left on the cow any longer when that takes place.
