Other people can think what they like so far as we are concerned. Our own opinion is that we Canadians should be happy and proud to welcome our Queen and her husband to

our shores. That we should be thankful we have a titular head of our tribe that gives our collective experience in life something to look up to. Something to stabilize, as it were, the inner emotions and otherwise irrational actions that are the feature of other countries striving to progress without the influence of constitutional monarchy.

When the young men of our country are called to war, for example, there might be some vestige of justification in fighting for what the Queen stands for. We doubt if that justification could be found in responding to the call on behalf of a political head of State. Beyond that she and her family represent something of the idealism we are all striving for, yet failing to achieve. Most of us recognize she has one of the most difficult jobs in the world and we admire her fortitude, humility and perseverance in discharging those responsibilities so unselfishly.

Letters to the Editors reveal the irrational thinking of some people concerning our Queen and one of the common objections to the present situation is the cost. This upsets us slightly. Whatever costs are connected with the Queen's tour will be represented by services so far as we can see. If those services are performed

by Canadians, and we suspect they will be, it seems to us it will just be the means of taking some money out of the central pocket and putting it in the pockets of the people performing the services. We have a good many of these gimmicks going and people generally keep asking for more, such as unemployment insurance, baby bonuses and pensions, mining subsidies, agricultural subsidies. So who can complain about a minor service subsidy such as the cost of the Royal tour?

The Queen will be in Hamilton on Thursday, July 2nd, and many of the school children will be there to see her, just as children of earlier generations have seen their Queen in years gone by. We suspect they will cheer lustily as the Queen passes by and possibly some tears will reach the surface as they survey her magic beauty. This is as it should be and may it ever be thus.

She comes at a time of disappointment with the international conference at Geneva, where wise men of the East and West had great argument, about it, and about, yet ever more came out by the same door wherein they went.

The Queen comes from the Old World to the New, from a land of a history reaching back to the declining days of the Roman Empire, from which Britain inherited the art of government and the urge for colonization, which culminated in a greater Empire than Alexander or Caesar ever dreamt of.
