NEW BRIDGE
AT CAYUGA

The Ontario Government has cal-
led tenders for the construction of a
new bridge to carry Highway 54 ac-
ross the Canadian National Railways
tracks at Cayuga.

Honourable James N. Allan, Pro-
vincial Treasurer, announced recently
that the bridge will cost an esti-
mated \$1,000,000. It will replace a
wood and steel structure which has
become unsafe and inadequate.

Closing date for tender bids is
June 10. Construction will com-
mence shortly thereafter.

While the bridge is being built, traf-
fic will cross the railway on a de-
tour immediately to the east of the
structure. When the bridge is com-
pleted, it is expected that the flow of
traffic on Highway 54 will be greatly
facilitated.

The Village has agreed to the clos-
ing of Hill Street. Provincial funds
which would have been used to main-
tain it will be spent instead, on the
re-grading of Winnett Street.
