The procedure to be followed in obtaining compensation has now been worked out. It is first necessary that the County Council pass a bylaw signifying its intention of participating. When that has been done the required number of valuers will be appointed. Each person suffering loss by this disease must complete a form for each animal that died and an affidavit must be taken. Payment is only made on those animals that have been shown to have died with the disease as recorded by the representatives of the Health of Animals Division. The county treasurer will pay the full indemnity and then make requisition to the government for the share to be paid by the federal and provincial governments.

Up to the end of March a total of 549.292 cattle had been tested in Ontario under the Brucellosis Area Plan. Six counties have been certified and testing is being conducted in eleven other counties at the present time. In these eleven counties 251,479 cattle have been tested and only 2.227 or 0.89 per cent were reactors. These reactors were found

It is expected that the drawing of blood samples may be started in Haldimand in the not too distant future. 
