According to a report from Dr. T. J. Cornish, who is in charge of the Health of Animals Branch in Bruce County, losses from Rabies infection has been heavy in the Bruce-Grey area. He reports 89 cattle, 2 horses and 16 sheep deaths were attributed to Rabies in Bruce, while in Grey the loss has been 257 cattle, 21 horses and 47 sheep. He estimates the value of these animals in excess of \$90,000.
