Lions Club Hear Talk On Netherlands

Andly Westerhuis a native Netherlands and a Canadian citizen since 1956, was the speaker at the Jarvis Lions Club Meeting on Monday night, November 9th. Mr. Westerhuis described his experiences in the Netherlands before emigrating to Canada in 1952. He brought up on a farm and his decision to come to this country across because of the increasing difficulty to obtain farm land in Holland. The land area of the country is about equivalent to Lake Erie and it supports 10 1/2 million people. He compared the crops and growing conditions with those in Canada and stated that an increasing number of farm people are finding their way to the cities for employment.

He described the difficulties of immigrants to this country due to the different language and many of his own experiences arising from this barrier of understanding. He said that his first year in Canada found him very homesick for the Netherlands but now he is well established and happy here. Mr. Westerhuis was very complimentary to the warmth and friendship of the Canadian people to the Hollanders. He said, "I think I can say that the Canadians are the Dutch people better than they would use Canadians going to Holland." A fellow native of the Netherlands Mr. Chas. Vlieter was also present at the meeting and spoke briefly.

Mr. Westerhuis was introduced by Leon West Marshall and a vote of thanks was extended to him by Leon Bob Lynch.

ONTARIO HOG PRICES

FOR NOV. 2ND, 3RD, 4TH, 5TH

TORONTO, NOVEMBER 5TH—The Ontario Hog Producers' Co-operative reports sales of Grade "A" hogs in Toronto this week at \$23.65 per cwt. Monday through Thursday No. 1 heavy sows sold at \$14.00, No. 1 light sows at \$16.00 and stags at \$11.00.

On the western markets this week, Winnipeg reports sales Monday through Wednesday at \$21.50 per cwt. Edmonton reports sales at \$20.40 Monday and Tuesday with the Calgary reporting sales at \$20.35, Tuesday at \$20.35 to \$20.55, and Wednesday at \$20.45 to \$20.50.

In Montreal hogs sold on the west end market Monday through Wednesday at \$20.00 per cwt and sows at \$14.00. The east end market reports hog sales Wednesday at \$20.65 with a few at \$24.00, while sows went for \$14.00 Wednesday.

Total hog gradings for the week of October 29th to October 18th were 56,287, an increase of 3,930 over the previous week. The number of hogs going through the 35 marketing yards of the Hog Co-operative in Ontario last week was 54,579, an increase of 13,942 over the previous week. This represents slightly over 84% of total gradings in Ontario. This figure does not include Ontario hogs going into Quebec.
