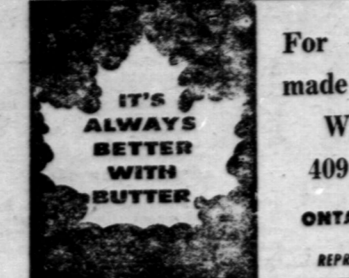


Back in August a Hospital Association from West Haldimand was formed. This decision was made at a meeting with about 100 interested people in attendance. The interest of the 100 people was aroused by the news that the Beckwith Hospital, in Hagersville, would close in the not too distant future. The realization that this district might find itself without Hospital services of any kind should, certainly, be enough to arouse the interest of everyone in the community.

In order to study the situation and to make some move toward providing Hospital facilities, a Board of twelve people was elected. The Board was to elect its own Chairman and the one so elected would also become the Chairman of the Association. Actually there was no competition for the job and, perhaps, for that reason we suddenly, and unexpectedly, found ourselves in the position of heading these two groups.

There has not been a meeting of the Hospital Association since last August and we are beginning to fear that the people who originally interested themselves in this matter will be thinking the elected Board has been sitting on their hands and waiting for something to happen. Since that is not the case we thought we might devote this space this week to briefly inform our readers that much time has been spent by the Board in trying to sort out the problems attendant to such a project and to lay a proper groundwork that will eventually lead to the construction of a hospital to serve the area. It is hoped, within the next few weeks to hold a meeting of the Association, and as many of the general public as may be interested enough to attend, and give in detail the progress that has been made to date.

This much can be said. The Board is proceeding with the definite objective of building a Hospital. It has been decided that it will be built in Hagersville, or close enough to make use of the Water and Sewage services provided there. It has not been definitely decided what size the building will be. Much depends on this. The chief factor in determining the number of beds will be the availability of funds to do the job. Money is theoretically available from two sources, aside from Federal and Provincial grants. These are public subscriptions and debenture issues undertaken at a municipal or County level. Funds will not come from any of these sources merely by snapping fingers and there will, undoubtedly,

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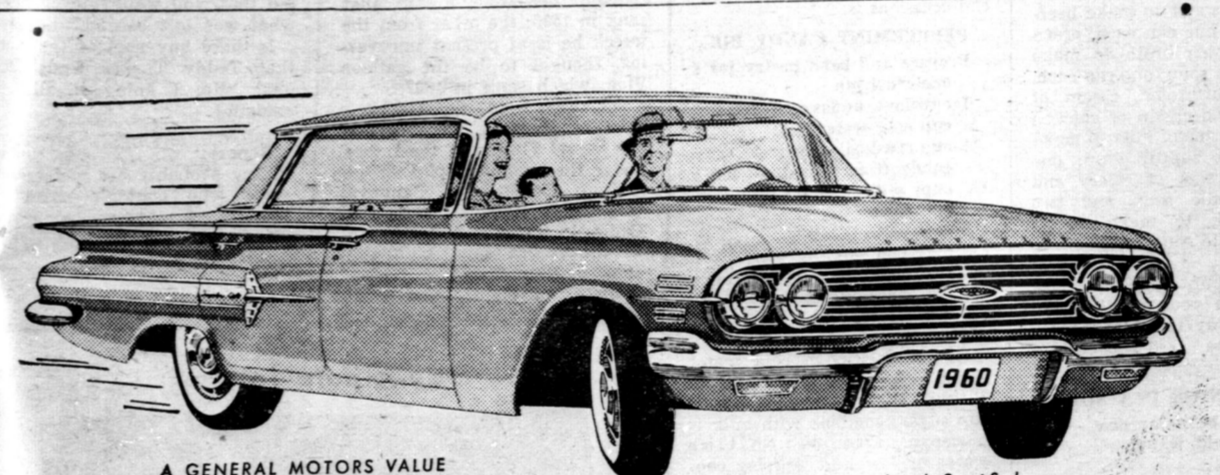
