This Week

Prime Minister Diefenbaker has put out the first feelers towards an over-all plan, he said during an address at the fall convocation of Assumption University.

"My hope is that each province will set up an organization out of formed representative of all the provinces of Canada... of church and religious bodies, cultural organizations, of business, labor, agricultural and all the elements of Canadian life, to make and co-ordinate appropriate plans for national activity."

He said he also hoped that consideration may be given to setting up in the capitals of each province villages-replicas of former days... with a composite village representative of all Canada being established in Ottawa.

He lauded the Roman Catholic Assumption University for accepting as affiliates the Anglican Canterbury College and the non-sectarian Essex College, an affiliation that has its parallel in the union of the two original races of Canada.

"What this university has attained in bringing unity out of diversity is an inspiration to all Canadians. Unity in diversity, mutual tolerance and forbearance in co-operation are the basis to Canadian confederation."

DISASTER ADVERTISED
When a Trans-Canada Air Lines Viscount plane carrying 35 passengers crashed short of the runway at Malton airport near Toronto last Saturday night, it narrowly missed a hydro transformer which would have exploded and enveloped the aircraft in flames.

All 39 aboard were shaken up but only four persons remained in hospital on Monday. The plane smashed into a muddy field 400 feet short of the runway, tore through a fence, bounced across an embankment and alighted across a road and a ditch. Its instrument nose cone was ripped off. Its two portable turbo-prop engines were torn from the wing and its tail was damaged.

The pilot, Capt. W. J. Harry Bell, 57, of Wildfield, Ont., attempting an instrument landing in a blinding rainstorm, suffered severe shock, suffered cuts and shock. The two injured passengers were Keith Haggard, 33, production supervisor for the Ontario Farm Producers Cooperative and Norm Garm, assistant supervisor.

RECOVER PAINTINGS
Six masterpieces with an insured value of \$640,000, stolen from the Toronto Art Gallery three weeks ago, were recovered last Saturday in a garage in the west end of Toronto. No arrests were made. Police Chief James Mackay said an anonymous telephone tip led to the recovery of the paintings, two Frans Hals, a Rubens and a Rembrandt.

WRONG BOX
A 10-year-old boy newly arrived at Oakville from England opened the little red box on the telephone pole, thinking it was a telephone. Within minutes he was surrounded by five fire trucks and 30 firemen. Now he knows they are fire alarms.

SEPTEMBER 28 - OCTOBER 2

TORONTO—Grade "A" hogs in Ontario this week are selling at \$25.00 per cwt. at marketing yards of the Ontario Hog Producers Cooperative with some hogs at \$25.25 at yards outside Toronto. No. 1 light sows—Monday to Wednesday \$14.00; Stags \$12.00 per cwt. for the week. On the west end markets this week Winnipeg reports hog sales at \$22.50 Tuesday and Wednesday \$22.25 to \$22.50 per cwt. Edmonton—Monday \$21.80; Tuesday \$22.10 and Wednesday at \$21.60.

In Montreal this week hogs sold on the west end market at \$25.00 per cwt. for hogs Tuesday and Wednesday at \$24.00 for sows.

Total hog gradings for the week of September 21st to 27th were 66,712, an increase of 10,992 over the previous week. The number of hogs going through the 35 marketing yards of the Hog Co-op in Ontario last week was 67,194, an increase of 13,258 over the previous week. This represents approximately 95 per cent of total gradings in Ontario. This figure does not include Ontario hogs going into Quebec.

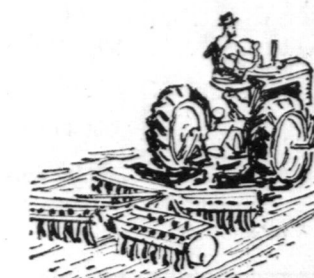
