ON THE FARM FRONT

Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer
 By Haldimand Harry

Hog production is continuing to go up and it would appear that over 8 million will go to market in Canada this year. It is not many years since 300 1/2 million more than last year and good 1 1/2 million above average for the following year. No doubt this will start a slow-down in production as the drop in price will amount to approximately \$2.00 per hog.
 There is one thing that hog producers should remember and that is that a cut-back may be in order but not to go to the way resulting in a cut-out. It is not many years since there was another drop in price from \$28.00 to \$23.00 and by July of the following year hogs were again completely out of hogs. Lower prices will make it possible to improve the breeding stock at reasonable prices. All together lower prices may make it possible to be in a much better position when prices come back.
 The C.N.E. is just over and already publicity is out for the Royal Winter Fair. This year's Royal promises to be even better than last and a great many features are being planned to make it more interesting and educational. We are told that there is likely to be a heavy demand for seats and if you are intending to go, plan to get your seats early if you would be a good idea to get your order in now. It will be recalled that at last year's event there was a complete sell-out. It is a long haul to have to stand through the whole performance.
 While food is being blamed for most of the increase in the cost of living, it is hardly fair to say so. Take milk for example; this is one of the cheapest foods that the consumer has to buy, particularly when measured by the time a worker has to toil to make enough to buy a quart in 1890 it took 26 minutes of factory time to pay for a quart of milk which was selling for an average price of 6 cents. In 1958, it only took a worker 7 minutes to earn enough to buy a quart of milk costing an average of 25 cents. This is one of the facts that should be given wide publicity especially among the Urban consumers.
 According to the latest information available, the 1959 crop of Canadian bluegrass should be about the same as it was in 1958. Most of the production in Canada is centered in the Niagara Peninsula with the bulk of it being grown in Haldimand. The crop last year was about 7,000,000 pounds as against a ten year average of 104 million pounds. It is predicted that this year's crop will be about 75 million pounds. This with a carry-over of 46 million pounds should supply the market satisfactorily.
 Hot weather may have been the cause of some of the drop in Creamery butter production in Haldimand County during the month of July. Actually the making during that month was down by almost 65,000 pounds. The total for the month in Haldimand was 255,963 pounds as compared with 320,818 pounds for the same month of last year.
