**This Week - -**

Recent heavy rainfalls over almost all Ontario have enabled farmers to prepare fields for seeding of fall wheat, and present indications are that a normal acreage will be sown.

The monthly report of the Ontario agriculture department said however that pasturing conditions vary. During August, pastures were burned and farmers had to do supplementary feeding in a dry area including Kent County, the Niagara Peninsula - southern Waterloo County, the southern portion of counties along Lake Ontario, and in Stormont, Prescott and Russell counties in Eastern Ontario and the Sudbury, Manitowish, Algoma and northern Cochrane districts.

Most of these areas however received rains since Aug. 25, and an early improvement in pasturing is expected, the report said.

Total production of the spring grains—oats, barley, mixed grains and spring wheat—now is estimated at 139,586,000 bushels, compared with 151,594,000 bushels in 1958.

The winter wheat crop in Ontario, by preliminary estimate, will be 11, 834,000 bushels compared with 23, 886,000 bushels last year. The acreage left for harvest was greatly reduced by unusually heavy winter killing. The yield per harvested acre dropped from 41.2 bushels in 1958 to 28.1 bushels in 1959.

CNE MASSES TARGET

Perfect weather, a spectacular air show and civic appeals for support boosted the final day attendance at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto to 289,000 people, compared with 287,500 on the final day last year.

But it was not enough to overcome the attendance drop throughout the fair. The 1959 total was 2,965,500, against 2,960,000 last year.

The air show, featuring the RCAF new F-86 Sabre aerobatic team, the Golden Hawks, with flights by the Russian TU-104 jetliner from Ottawa's Uplands airport, made the CNE's windup as thrilling as the opening in which 19 destroyers and frigates of several NATO nations had dropped anchor for a review by Earl Mountbatten, Britain's defence chief.

Unusually hot weather and public criticism of the grandstand show, dogged the exhibition from the start this year. The U.S. television comedian George Gobel star of the grand stand show, got into hot water with what were called "distasteful" jokes in his first grandstand appearances.

**PLANE FLIGHT**

A Royal Air Force Vulcan jet bomber made the first non-stop transatlantic jet flight from the RCAF station at Trenton on Sunday. The plane, which had taken part in the CNE air show at Toronto left Trenton and crossed the Atlantic in five hours, 55 minutes, to its home base at Finningly in north England.

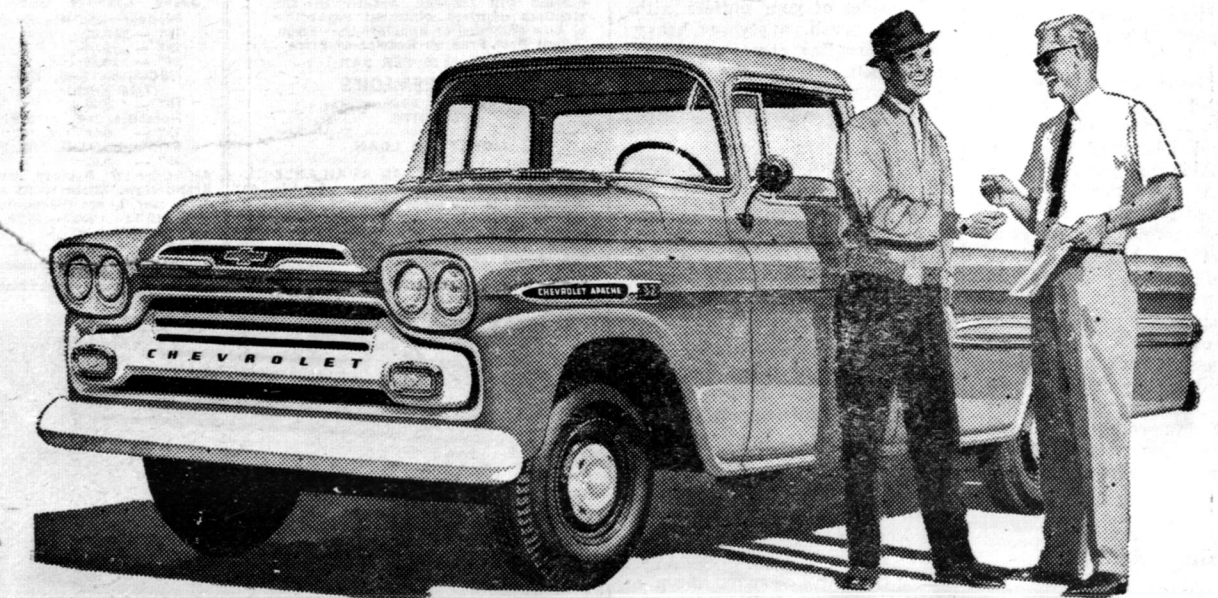
**IN MEMORIAM**

Pinkeye is a cattle disease that is often passed off as nothing serious and at the same time it can cause considerable loss to the cattle owner. Beef cattle go off feed and dairy cows will drop in milk when the disease strikes. Blindness has been known to develop in some cases although this is usually only a temporary matter. The disease can appear very suddenly and spread rapidly through the whole herd by means of the discharges from the eye that gather on the muzzle of the beast. Flies are often the carriers of the disease from one animal to another. Good management is the most effective and practical means of treatment. Treatment is not recommended for beef cattle but quick milking cows can be treated by washing out the eyes with a solution of 4 per cent boric acid or 1 per cent argrol. This should be done twice daily.
