

A great many inquiries are being received these days by agricultural authorities as to the feeding value of sorghum grass. Dr. W. E. Tossell of the O.A.C. is not at all sure that this crop has a place in Ontario agriculture. He suggests that if a farmer insists he might try it out on his own farm, probably an area only. In trials at the O.A.C. during the past year it failed to give more pasture than sudan grass and it was not very satisfactory as a silage crop. There is still some doubt as to its ability to withstand Ontario winter conditions and not enough is yet known on its prussic acid content. Research is continuing and timight be a good idea to hold off trying it to any extent until more is known of the crop.


