ON THE FARM FRONT

Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

Beef cattle people will be encouraged to learn that no breeder is needed to be expected for another two years, at least that is the word which comes from a reliable source. It appears that the beef cattle price level is allied very closely with beef cattle populations and according to the experts there should not be a sufficient build-up of population either here in Canada or across the line in the U.S. to break the market until after 1960 and 1961. This will not mean that high prices will always prevail but prices should be satisfactory.

While it may be a few weeks before cattle will be turned out on pasture, it might still be a good time to remind dairymen that care is needed at this time to avoid objectionable flavours. Any sudden change from winter feeding to fresh lush pasture will usually result in strong feed flavours in the milk. The safest way to avoid this difficulty is to keep cows away from this type of feed for several hours before milking. It just requires some good judgment and the use of good grazing practices. Cows should not be turned out on pasture until the grasses and legumes are at least six inches high. This will avoid the cattle feeding on any of the strongly flavoured weeds.

There isn't any profit in farm accidents unless a safety specialist is present. Of course, it is difficult to place any dollar value on the cost of a farm accident since there are so many indirect costs as well as the direct costs that have to be taken into consideration. Farm accidents cost have been likened to an iceberg with a very small portion of it visible. The much larger part below the waterline represents such items as time lost by the worker, cost of hired help to replace the injured person, possible loss of crops due to the delays caused by the accident and actual damage done to the equipment. Of course, the physical damage to the equipment is only a small part of the cost. It is the loss of time and the inconvenience and discomfort and inconvenience that goes along with any major accident. Farm profits can be increased by reducing the number of accidents.

During the month of March, some 28 breeders across the province had boars inspected and approved for mating under the Boar Premium Policy. Altogether there were 86 boars approved and in many of the cases the sire is qualified which means that the bonus will amount to five dollars more. Two breeders in Haldimand County appear on the list with an even half-dozen boars. They are Messrs. Elmer Cowan and Sons and Messrs. Walker Hedley and Sons both of Canfield. A complete list of the boars that have been approved can be seen at the office of your Agricultural representative.

If your cows are going down in milk just about this time of year it may be because you have had up all (continued on page five)
