Brief Notes for the Busy Farmer

The high cost of dairying was emphasized in a recent press release to the effect that the minimum investment required to finance an enterprise of this sort would be \$50,000. This is just about three times the amount required twenty years ago. One of the great reasons for this tremendous increase has been the problem of finding adequate and suitable labour, and capital in the form of large machines is being substituted. This is borne out by statistics which show that during the past 20 years the size of the average dairy farm has doubled and there has been a corresponding increase in the number of farm workers has dropped by one third.

The results of a local test with stilbestrol in the feeding of steers have just been reported and they are rather interesting. Fifteen head treated with one brand of stilbestrol made an average gain of 261 pounds from December 1st, 1959 to April 1st

1960. A second group of sixteen head, during the same period, using a different brand of material, made a similar gain of 277 pounds. The third group which received no treat-

third group which received no treatment and acting as a check made an overall gain of 250 pounds. In other words, it is possible to put on an extra 25 pounds or thereabouts in about four months or approximately half of the average feeding period. It is reasonable to assume that a total gain of 50 pounds may be expected at the end of the feeding period. Using an arbitrary value of 25 cents per pound, this increase means \$12.50 more for the treated animals. This test is being carried out on the farm of L. B. Mehlenbacher & Son.
