The Pilot System In South Walpole School Area

It has been an established fact for a generation or more that a teacher can teach two grades easily and more effectively than eight grades. This fact is recognized all over this continent and probably far beyond, and it is being applied in the South Walpole school area.

The reasons for this are fairly obvious. The teaching of eight grades in different rooms or schools involves a tremendous duplication of effort on the part of the teacher. Each teacher has eight complete courses of study to prepare and teach in addition to the regular curriculum. She has to divide the required five hours of class time per day among eight grades, a motion which is not only wasteful but also inefficient. In the coming year in the west grade with only one pupil each, five grades with only two pupils and three with only three pupils. This includes a lot of the single pupil in a grade especially in an awkward one. Either the teacher's pet or the forgotten pupil. Few teachers, with seven grades to teach, feel justified in spending the same time on each one as on a grade with six or eight pupils. He will probably be given a work book (one of the short cuts provided for overworked teachers) and allowed to teach himself.

These and other benefits of the two grade system have until recently been denied the rural pupil. Transportation systems because the deciding factor in bringing these advantages to our rural school population, through central schools and pilot systems. When existing accommodations become inadequate or obsolete, school boards everywhere are building central schools, and at this present time in Ontario, ten rural, one room schools, every week of the year, are being replaced in this way. Where existing schools are in good condition and roads are suitable, a pilot system is sometimes practical and does not involve the expenditure required to build a new school.

The School Board of South Walpole are dedicated to the proposition that every child in our Area is entitled to as good an education as we can provide for him and he can absorb. The Pilot system was suggested by one of our members who is in touch with similar systems elsewhere. Our Inspector, Mr. T. R. Brown, approved the plan in principle and asked only for the proposition with regard to choice of teachers for various grades. At a special meeting were approached by various members of the Board as a matter of course.

The plan, slated to go into effect in September, is as follows: Grades 1, 2 and 3 at Nanticoke, Grades 4, 5 & 6 at No. 16, Grades 6 and part of 7 at No. 21 and Grade 8 and balance of 7 at No. 18, subject to any changes of staff which might occur in the interim. The bus route has been carefully clocked for mileage and time element, and compares almost exactly with our present contract. There would never be more than a bus load at any time but because of the greater number of pupils being moved, a much higher percentage of the available seats would be collected, thus reducing the cost to the taxpayer.

This is not in any sense a reflection on any teacher but is, rather, an opportunity to each one to make her own worthwhile contribution by teaching the particular age group she is eminently best qualified to teach. No teacher has been asked to move from her present location and, although their work will be greatly reduced, no one is being asked to accept a reduced salary. South Walpole salaries are on a par with any area in Halton County. The lowest salary paid a qualified teacher in Halton County is \$3000.00. Our lowest is \$3200.00. The highest salary for a one room school in this County is \$4600.00. Miss Sna Swartz, our teaching staff have left by each other so that county meetings will be dealt with in the strong bi-partisan manner which is the heritage of Canadian democracy and to the end that the concept of Halton County as a safe and undemanding Progressive Conservative seat in both governments might be dispelled.

Thomas Jacob and Garfield Disher, Dumville, expressed approval for the formation of a county association rather than a riding association. The Pilot System is admittedly not the ultimate in educational organization, and is not to be compared with the Central School. It is, however, better than what we now have and is, in fact, a workable, practical plan which will benefit every school child and every teacher in South Walpole, and bring hardship to no one.

The School Board of South Walpole has always one thought in mind: the safety, well being and better education of every child under its care, and to this end we would ask for the sympathetic understanding and cooperation of every ratepayer.
